

THIRTIETH YEAR IN N. S. LINE SERVICE

TWO EMPLOYEES HONORED

Given Space in Monthly Magazine of Organization; Both Are Known in This Vicinity

Friends of two popular employes of the North Shore Line are given due honor in the last issue of *The Highball*, a magazine published monthly by and for employes of that line, when it reports at length that each of them had completed the thirtieth year of service with the road. The story from the *Highball* refers to J. G. Hicks, formerly of Highland Park, and F. M. Curley of Highwood. It is written by Albert W. Gerbin, and is as follows:

The month of August marked the thirtieth milestone in the career of two of the most widely known and popular veterans of the North Shore Line. John G. Hicks, silver-haired, friendly and courteous "old-timer," who in his capacity of Employment Manager has started countless youngsters on successful careers with the "Road of Service," reached the 30-year mark on August 5. Three days later Frank M. Curley, veteran motorman, celebrated his thirtieth year of faithful service by taking out his daily work train, for the mounting years have but sharpened his eyesight and increased his steadiness and reliability.

Eight Runs Daily

Both of these pioneers in the inter-urban electric railroad field started as trainmen. There was little choice in those days as the entire personnel of the tiny Bluff City Electric Street Railway numbered but 22—including 20 trainmen and two clerks! Only eight runs were made daily. This did not mean, however, that the work was light and pleasant! On the contrary the hours were likely to be anywhere from sunrise to sunset. The wage scale for beginners started at 17 cents an hour. The rolling stock consisted of 14 cars—eight double-truck motors and six single-truck trailers. Cash fares prevailed for a time before a system ticket was evolved.

Is Promoted

Mr. Hicks served as conductor until December 30, 1919, when he became Pass Clerk. He served in the latter capacity until November 10, 1920, when he was made Employment manager, in which position he is actively and capably serving today. Motorman Curley started his service in the old power house at Highwood. He recalls how they were kept busy when four trains were on the line at once and how often it became necessary for train movement to halt until the power house supply could meet such a heavy demand! He served a year in the power house and then he was transferred to the shops. After a year of tinkering with the dinky little cars he became a motorman, in which capacity he is serving actively today.

LARGEST CONTROLLED REINDEER MIGRATION

With the permission of the Dominion Government, the Dominion Reindeer company of this Province will start upon a controlled migration of a herd of 12,000 reindeer from Alaska to the Hudson Bay district. The animals will be driven slowly by the easiest overland routes from their present range among the Alaskan foothills eastward across the northern part of the continent to the new grazing grounds set aside for them in the barren lands that border the western shore of Hudson Bay.

As the distance is about 2000 miles and the herd will travel only 10 miles a day, and must rest at intervals, 18 months, it is expected, will be required for the migration.
