THE PRIVILEGE OF VOTING

Many of our people here in Illinois have not seemed to value much the privilege of voting. If they had lived in some autocratic country, where tyrannical rulers or selfish aristocracies handed out whatever government they saw fit, these folks would realize what a blessing popular government is. They would want to do their part to keep making it a success.

Popular government gives every citizen the chance to protect his own rights. If one is afflicted with evils which can be remedied, the ballot gives him his chance. If he is suffering from certain grievances, there will be a lot of people who also suffer. If they unite and act together, their voice will be heard.

But popular government does not run itself. If the voters neglect the privilege of the ballot, selfish people will use it in their own interest, and democratic government will fail to assure the public welfare. Everybody should vote.

TYPES OF VOTERS

First, there is the prejudice vote. These people have fixed and unreasonable antipathies, and vote to spite some individual or class of people.

There is the selfish vote. Sometimes it seems as if the majority of the American people belong in that element. They vote for the candidate or party which they think will do the most for their own selfish interests, regardless what effect that has on the whole country.

There is the intelligent vote. These people read and think. Such people do not think alike, but their vote is at least based on reasonable grounds.

Last, there is the conscience vote, finest of all. These are people who have very high ideals for Illinois and America, and who will vote for any cause that seems likely to do justice to all elements. The selfish and prejudiced voters injure their own interests by short-sighted policies, while the conscience and intelligence vote promotes prosperity as well as justice.

Big Homecoming Game Scheduled for This Week-end; Parade to Be Feature

A two day homecoming celebration will mark the Northwestern-Minnesota football game at Evanston, Saturday, Nov. 3. Thousands of alumni from every corner of the country will come to Evanston to participate in the festivities and to see the Purple eleven in action against the powerful Gophers.

The traditional homecoming parade, \$500 dollars worth of fireworks, the biggest bonfire since Pontiac was a papoose, a freshman football game, a snake dance after the big game and an informal dance at the gymnasium are the principal features of the program. 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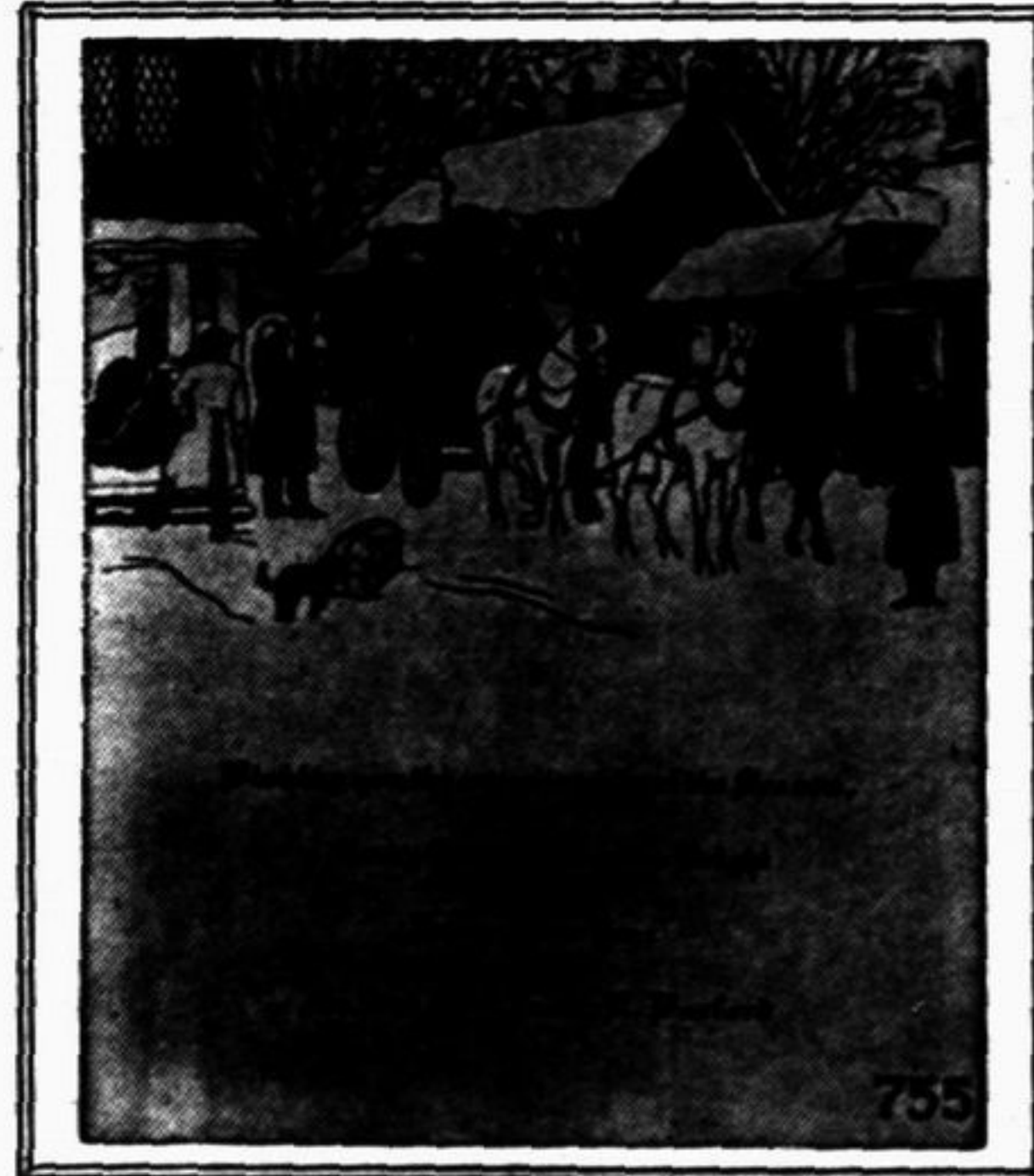
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
