Christ church, Winnetka, was the scene of a particularly pretty wedding on Saturday evening, October 20, when Miss Marian Adelaide Black, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Stanley Black of Glencoe, and Walter Ernest Welge, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frederick Welge of Evanston, were married by the Rev. The church was decorated with wall pockets of autumn leaves, and with chrysanthemums and potted tropical ferns in the chancel. Instead of the regulation wedding procession an innovation was introduced. For the first time in fourteen years, the Christ church's Boy choir took part in the nuptial ceremony. After preliminary organ music, the first notes of the wedding march were sounded, and from the back of the church came the sound of fresh young voices singing Bridal chorus from "Lohengrin." The choir came up the same aisle, followed by the minister and the wedding party.

The bride wore a Lanvin model of transparent velvet in old ivory. Her veil was of exquisite lace, a family heirloom, one that was worn by her grandmother. She carried a colonial bouquet of valley lilies and gardenias, Miss Ruth Mills, maid of honor, and the Misses Alice, Katherine and Mary Mills, bridesmaids, wore frocks of velvet in rich petunia shades and carried bouquets of mixed flowers. Mrs. Black, mother of the bride, wore a striking ensemble of dark petunia velvet trimmed in chinchilla fur, and Mrs. Welge, the groom's mother, wore Burgundy velvet and d'Alencon lace.

Mr. Welge was attended by Robert Howell of Evanston as the best man. The ushers were John Howell, Gavion Elwood, Richard Hough, and Harvey Snook of Santa Barbara, Cal.

After the ceremony at the church, a reception was held at the home of the bride's parents in Glencoe. The terrace had been canvassed and converted into a veritable garden through a generous use of chrysanthemums and branches of oak with colored leaves. Three sets of French doors opened onto the terrace from the living room, giving a spacious effect to both rooms. The windows of the sun room were screened in vines and flowers, and through a skillful lighting effect gave the illusion of a garden bower.

Mr. and Mrs. Welge are spending their honeymoon at French Lick springs. They will occupy the Black residence for the winter months, while Mr. and Mrs. Black are in California.
