Scott Brown, of Chicago, widely known as a successful attorney, was elected president of the Illinois Chain ber of Commerce at the closing ses sion of the annual meeting in this cago on Oct. 19. He succeeds John H. Camlin of Rockford, who has been president of the state chamber for several years.

Mr. Brown, who has specialized to corporation law and who has long shown keen interest in practical public movements, was instrumental in founding the Industrial development department of the Illinois Chamber of Commerce and formerly was chair man of the committee having that work in charge.

Some years ago Mr. Brown assisted in the organization of the Nortt American Light & Power Co. and was one of the six original owners. He was also an official of and financially interested in the Illinois Power & Light Corp. and the Illinois Traction Mr Brown was also secretary and general counsel for the Stude baker Corp. for nine years,

Among the clubs to which he holdmembership are: The Chicago, Unior League, University, Quadrangle and Glen View Golf Club of Chicago. Lo tus ('lub of New York and the Midwick and Annandate Golf clubs of Pasadena, Calif. Mr. Brown was graduated from the University of Chicago and from the law school of Northwestern University. TRAPSHOOTING IS UNIQUE PASTIME

OF AMERICAN ORIGIN, TOO

Something About This Sport In the United States; Annual Shoots Are Classic Events

Trapshooting is perhaps the most unique of sports and, all things considered, the most characteristically American of them all. One of the most striking features of clay target shooting is that the number of participants is usually greater than the number spectators, a fact which distinguishes the trap game from other sports where the "gallery" is made up of hundreds and even thousands of people watching individual players or teams in action. On the other hand, a trapshooting meet, with several hundred shooters toeing the mark, may draw a gallery of less than one quarter the number of shooters. Another thing about trapshooting is that more take part in sectional tournaments than participate in a meet of any other sport of the entire list. Besides, clay target shooting is essentially an amateur sport and not a single one of the sanctioned tournaments is for professionals.

The classic event in trapdom is the Grand American championship and handicap tournament, an annual affair which has been staged for twenty-eight years. This year the August events were scheduled to occur at Vandalia, Ohio, near Dayton. The site is the permanent home grounds of The Amateur Trapshooting association of America. Last year's record of 873 entrants were exceeded.

Besides the Grand American han- dicap and major sectional handicaps, more than one thousand "registered" shoots have been arranged for the present year.

NEW I. C. C. HEAD INTERNATIONAL PARK PLAN IS SUGGESTED

INITIATED BY THE U. S.

Senator Shipstead Tells Plan While on Visit to Winnipeg Recently; Would Preserve Quetico Forest

A move toward the establishment of a large international park in the heart of the American continent has been initiated by the United States Government, Senator H. Shipstead of Minnesota said on a visit to Winni-

The co-operation of the Canadian Government will be essential in this project, Senator Shipstead said. In fact, most of the land required for the purpose lies in Canada.

U. S. Started It

The United States has started a move to reclaim the Quetico forest for the park, in accordance with the old Webster-Ashburton treaty. Senator Shipstead is chairman of the committee named by Congress to survey the territory lying within the United States. The Canadian government will be asked to keep the tracts of forest running from Rainy river and Lake Nipigon north out of private hands, so that it may be made part of the proposed international playground.

"We have already withdrawn all publicly owned land from sale and are now buying back tracts which have gone into private hands," Senator Shipstead said, referring to the steps already taken on the United States side. "There will be many matters to discuss, such as protection of the fish and wild life of the territory, control of the traffic through the park and similar matters.

Mostly In Canada

"As the greater part of the land mentioned in the old Webster-Ashburton treaty lies in Canada we do not press the matter too hard. We are hoping, however, that your Government will see the value of keeping a natural beauty spot in the heart of the continent for play purposes, as this country is bound to fill with people very soon."


