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POLICE SEEK MAN WHO SLUGGED GIRL

Tells of Assault

Miss Kelley, who recovered consciousness after an operation had been performed on her skull at the hospital, told of the assault upon her. She said she was opposite the residence of W. J. Quigley at 449 East Illinois road when she was assaulted.

Miss Kelley had gone to the business center with her brother Albert to do some shopping about 6:30 o'clock in the evening. When she left him she announced that she would walk back home, and for him not to wait for her. She told the police that the assailant had struck her before she was even aware that any one was behind her.

"I didn't see any one and I don't know whether there was just one man

or more," she asserted, on regaining consciousness. "I don't remember anything about it."

She was found unconscious on the Quigley lawn near the sidewalk, about 8 o'clock. At last report she was recovering.

Miss Cook was on the way to her home at 939 Beach lane, in Highland Park, when a man accosted her and tried to grasp her by the arms. He fled, she said, when she broke away and began screaming. Miss Art's experience was somewhat similar. She lives at 111 High street, Highland.

Several suspects were picked up by the police Saturday night but after they had been held over Sunday they were released, as it was not evident that they were connected with the Kelley case. One of the men was identified by Miss Art, the police report, but as he was a man with a family, she refused to make a complaint, it was stated. The investigation is still in progress.
