Praises Park Board
Mr. Hastings who has always taken a great interest in Sunset Valley was present and spoke of the good work the Park Board had done in the development of the course and of its efficient administration. Mr. Millard, president of the Park Board, responded and spoke of the prominent part Mr. Hastings had played in the originating of the golf course, in fact it was Mr. Hastings' idea.

Mr. Rigdon then spoke of some of the activities of the Park Board in other matters.

One of the guests who attended the meeting afterwards remarked that he had never attended a gathering in Highland Park where all were so congenial and such true friendliness prevailed among all present.

The report of the president and treasurer was presented and upon motion was approved. Some of the items in the report were discussed.

President's Report
Following are excerpts from the president's report:

During the season to November 1 there was 24,105 registered for play. Of this number 9,274 were members, 8,303 were residents but not members, 6,538 were non-residents. Thus only 26 per cent of the players were non-residents who provided nearly half of the entire revenue.

The changing of the rate for non-residents to \$2.50 on Sunday forenoon reduced the play materially and while it lowered the receipts on Sunday considerably the increased play on week days more than made up the loss of Sunday play for the season.

The following is a report of the tournament activities for the season:

Tournament Activities
Highland Park Open Championship Tournament: John Gantor defeated Everett Inman 3 and 2. This cup is known as the Moraine Cup.

North Shore Open Championship Tournament

This tournament was won by Al Espinosa of the Illinois Golf club, with a total of 140. John P. Rouse, Jr., was second with 148; Art Olson, our local haberdasher, was third with 150; for fourth place there was a four cornered tie at 151, Sam Bernardi, Briargate Country club, Dick Linares, Los Angeles, Cal. (runner-up in California Professional Golf association), Frank Brady, a well known Chicago "Pro," and Ray Espinosa (brother of Al) of the Mission Hills Country club. Dick Linares was winner in the play off.

It may be of interest to the members to know that Al Espinosa finished second in Western Open, was runner-up in the National Professional Golf Championship, finished sixth in the National Open. He also is a sterling golfer and a member of the American pro team.

The Club Championship was won by Edward A. Laing by defeating Joe Davis 3 and 2. Davis got away to an awful lead in the morning, at the end of the 11th hole was five up but Laing steadied down and kept cutting Davis' lead till he was only 1 down at the turn. This cup is known as the W. A. Alexander Trophy.

In addition to the major tournaments above listed the regular weekly tournaments were held as scheduled in the calendar for the year.

There are 303 members in the Sunset Valley club classed as follows: 140 X members, 122 A members, 41 B members.

While the X membership represents 280 persons no charge in dues was made for the women members; therefore the receipts were on the basis of 303 members. A financial report follows giving full detail of all transactions.

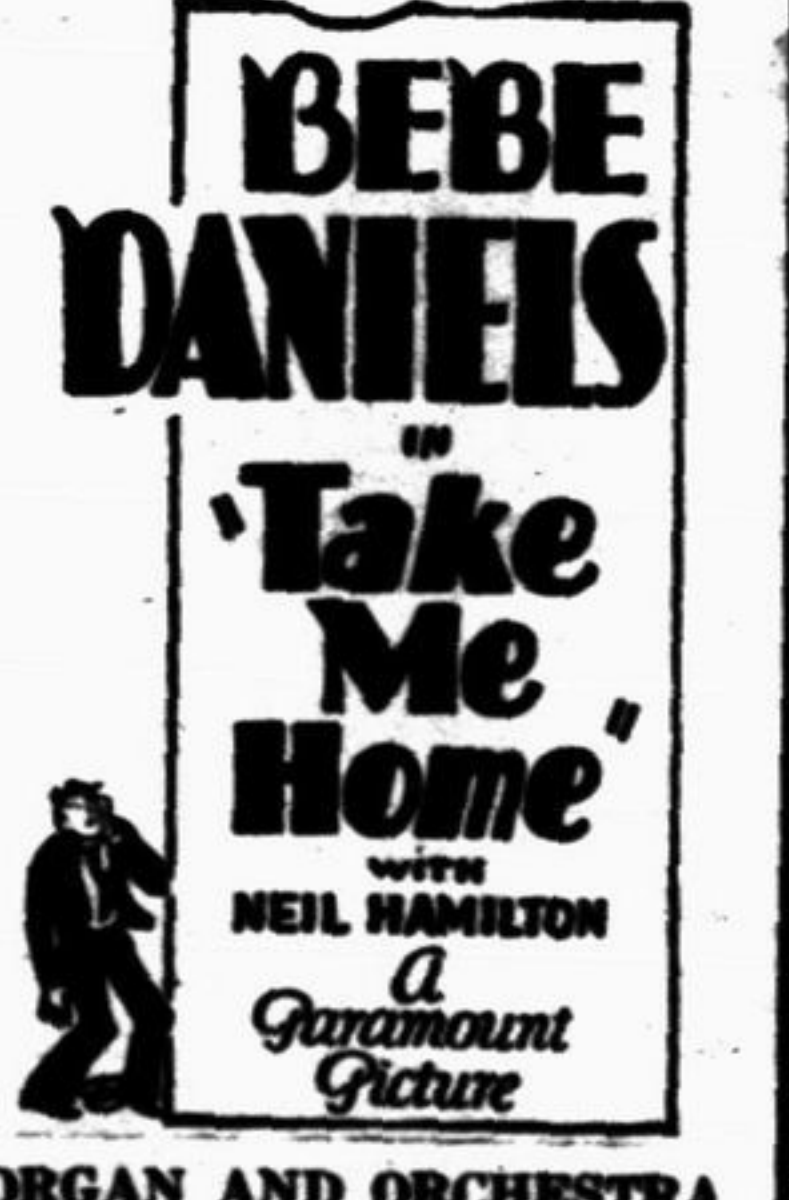
