Herbert Hoover led all candidates in the number of votes received in Lake county by getting 26,814 it was disclosed in the canvass completed Friday by County Clerk Lew A. Hendee.

Second in line stood Ruth Hanna McCormick, candidate for congressman-at-large, who received 25,882. In all 40,032 people went to the polls.

ILLINOIS AND OHIO STATE PLAY NOV. 24

Another Great Battle Is in Prospect Between These Grid Giants

Another great Ohio State-Illinois gridiron battle is predicted Nov. 24 when the Buckeyes invade the Illini stadium to close the season.

Ever since 1917, with the exception of 1918, the Illini and Buckeyes have met in the last game of the season and often it has decided the championship. The Illini probably are the under-dogs in this year's combat but they can take cheer from the memory of the 1921 contest at Columbus when they upset the Buckeyes and deprived them of the championship. That year Illinois previously had lost all of its conference games.

Two years ago Ohio State scratched out a 7-6 victory in the stadium when Frosty Peters missed a drop kick for point after touchdown. Last year Illinois won at Columbus but the Buckeyes gave them their hardest game.

This year's Ohio State team is a strong outfit, which includes a great backfield headed by Eby, a brilliant openfield runner. Raskowski, all-American tackle and Barratt, 236-pound center, are two imposing linemen.

That Illinois will come back strong in its final game is the hope of the Orange and Blue partisans. It is to be expected that Zuppke will have them keyed to the highest pitch.

MIDWEST ARMY-NAVY GAME THANKSGIVING

To Be Played at Soldiers Field Nov. 29 Between Fort and Naval Station

Final plans were made for the annual midwest Army-Navy football championship game, at a conference last week between Admiral Thomas Craven, Commandant of the Great Lakes Naval Training Station, and Colonel Frederick B. Shaw, Commanding Officer at Fort Sheridan. This game, the sixth in the series between the soldier and sailors, will take place at Soldiers Field, Chicago, on Thanksgiving Day, November 29, 1928, commencing at 1:30 p. m. The game will be preceded by a combined

military pageant, starting at 12:30 p. m., participated in by soldiers from Fort Sheridan, sailors from the Great Lakes, and units from the Illinois National Guard, American Legion, and the Chicago R.O.T.C. In addition, soldiers and sailors will put on battalion parades between halves. The game is held for the combined benefit of the Army and Navy Relief Funds and for the recreational and athletic funds of both Fort Sheridan and the Great Lakes Station. Many distinguished military and naval guests from Washington and the Sixth Corps Area will be in attendance as well as high officials from the State of Illinois and the City of Chicago.

N. S. LINE PLANS BIG STATION AT WAUKEGAN

Ten Story Building Is Contemplated, According to Report From That City

Plans of the Chicago, North Shore and Milwaukee railway to construct a ten story station, hotel and office building on the present site of the Arlington hotel, in Waukegan were announced last week by Britton I.

Budd, president of the road, says the Waukegan Sun. The final plans have been approved, a bond issue is planned and it is expected that actual construction will be started very shortly. The announcement of the approving of the plans for the \$1,000,000 building puts at rest the persistent report that the North Shore line was contemplating the purchase of the present site of the post office for their new Waukegan terminal.

The plans, drawn up by A. W. Gerber, architect, call for a ten story building of brick, steel, re-inforced concrete and stone. The architect's drawing shows a beautiful building that will adequately house the North Shore line terminal for many years to come and will include first class hotel accommodations and highly desirable office space. The removal of the old Arlington hotel building will obliterate another of the landmarks of the county as the hotel was an institution in the early days of Little Fort.

Just how soon the building will be under construction cannot be stated at this time, but John E. Burt, local real estate dealer, has been advised that the bonds for the building will be issued.
