**REPUBLICAN MAJORITY LARGE IN LEGISLATURE**

Governor-elect Louis L. Emmerson will have a huge majority in both houses of the state assembly when he takes office next January, even if the present line-up.

The Republicans will have a margin of 31 or 32 in the house and 39 or 40 in the senate, there having been no change, because of the number of hold-overs in the senate, of any particular change. Out of the 26 hold-overs, 20 were Republicans, and the only apparent change politically is in the second district, in Chicago, where Senator George Van Lent appears to have been beaten by former Ald. Joseph Mendel, Democrat.



**CHIROPRACTOR BOEYE IS FINED; NO APPEAL**

J. J. Boeye, Evanston chiropractor found guilty of treating human ailments without having a license to practice, on Friday was fined \$250 by Circuit Judge C. C. Edwards. Boeye is not to take an appeal. He was given a few days to get the money.

Assistant States Attorney S. H. Block demanded that Boeye be given a jail sentence. The statute provided for a fine of not less than \$100 or more than \$500 or not more than a year in jail or both.

Boeye treated Margaret Bremer, 6, Highland Park last February. He diagnosed the case as tonsillitis and physicians found that the child died from diphtheria.
