HIGHWOOD DEFEATS WARREN PARK, 21-0

Visitors Unable to Stop Highwood Backs; Play Winnetka Next Sunday

A wet field prevented the Highwood eleven from running up a larger score in their game with the Warren Park A. C. which they won by the score of 21-0. A good crowd was present despite the threatening skies and the cold breezes.

Due to late arrival of the visiting team the game was started rather late, but by shortening the time-out periods and the half rest period, they were able to play the whole game.

In the first quarter Highwood scored a safety in the first five minutes of play, when Santi broke through and blocked a punt which Warren Park recovered behind their goal line. Warren Park kicked off to Highwood and an exchange of punts left the ball on the Warren Park thirty yard line. A long pass to Dever put the ball on the fifteen yard line, and Dever made five more through left tackle, after which Boylan went through right tackle for the touchdown.

In the second quarter Highwood took the ball down the length of the field, using only line plays, only to lose the oval by a fumble on the

scoring play. Highwood scored two more touchdowns in the second half with long marches down the field. With Fink running the ends, 'Abbott and Boylan slipping thru the tackles and Cronkte plowing through center and right guard, the Warren Park boys were unable to hold down the score although they fought hard to do so.

Next Sunday Highwood plays Winnetka at New Trier high school athletic field. This fray, which promises to be a good game and on Thanksgiving Day Highwood plays Lake Forest at Farwell field.
