possible knowledge of our social order. First in importance in the social sciences is "economics." In order to act intelligently we must know all about it, for it deals with fundamental processes connected with the social order. Second "sociology" deals with social customs and prejudices, it is important to understand any "institutional lag" in this connection. Third, in discussing "political science," we are cautioned about having opinions where science has not given us facts. Fourth "ethics," which studies ideals and the relationships of ideals to human life, and fifth "logic." In this connection pragmatic philosophy and pragmatic logic is discussed in Mr. Smith's lucid and highly intelligible manner. Professor Smith lectures to seniors at the University of Chicago and every Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday at 8 a. m. he is broadcasting his lectures on ethics to the law students. Next Monday, Nov. 26 at 3:45 p. m. Mr. Smith will conclude his series of lectures in Highland Park. His subject will be "Capitalism and the Modern World."

In the south part of Highland Park and more particularly in Ravina, it is reported, there has developed an issue over this question. As a whole, it is reported, the community seems to favor the plan to enlarge the park, but many believe it should be done without special assessment. The Park Board has explained its position, but some protests have been filed and several meetings held. The matter is set for hearing in county court Dec. 12. The mass meeting is called before that date with the prospect that perhaps a more harmonious sentiment may be developed. President Millard of the Park board and President Oliver of the N. S. Sanitary District are expected to be present, it is announced.
