NUMEROUS EVENTS IN DEERFIELD HISTORY

In the days when the settlers listened for the sound of their own cowbells (for every bel lhad a different sound and keen ears recognized the tinkle of the bell on the stray cow, or the one returning from the pasture.) books were more of a luxury \$4,000 to this. than they are today. The long winter evenings in the log cabins were enlivened by tales of the former homeland. Stories of these pioneers are incorporated in the history of Deerhundred, sev of bunco, and five of western settlement. The story of the Chicago from which the immigrants fled in their disappointment is told in an account by L. B. Caswell, grandfather of Mrs. W. W. Reichardt of Highland Park. On page 208, Mr. Caswell who was a member of congress from 1880 to 1891 tells of the appearance of Chicago in 1836.
