don" is the title of his daughter's intensely interesting lecture.

To lovers of her world-famous father, Miss London's introduction to public life as a popular lecturer was an event of prime importance. Her success was immediate and gratifying. She was her father's daughter, but more than this she was herself a woman of force, personality and talent. "I see the mighty Jack in her," H. L. Mencken said after hearing one of her lectures, while George Douglas wrote in the San Francisco Bulletin, "I have heard many lectures, but none that has held me as she always holds her audience. It is a rare gift that she has inherited and perfected, the gift of magnetic utterance, of commanding undivided attention and communicating enthusiasm."

Adventurer and rover, a dynamic force in the literature of his day, Jack London, in addition to his fame, bequeathed to his daughter a unique and very human heritage. So close was the relationship between the great man and the little girl that, although he died when she was only fifteen years old, Joan London absorbed the outstanding qualities of his greatness. A love of all things brave and fine and clean, a hatred of pettiness, of sham, of pretense, the qualities that distinguished the father in his life and works, gave wings to the child's development.
