PIONEER RESIDENT DIES VERY SUDDENLY

MORNING FUNERAL THIS

Mr. Fred A. Richards, Civil War Veteran, Passes On; Was Highly Respected Citizen

Mr. Frederick C. Richards, one of the pioneer residents of Highland Park and Lake county, passed away Monday evening at the Highland Park hospital. About a week ago he had been removed to the hospital because of an infected foot. Later it was found that amputation was necessary. The operation was very successful and it was thought that he was getting along nicely, until Monday when a change took place and he died suddenly at six-thirty in the afternoon.

Mr. Richards was born in Waukegan on February 24, 1846. At the age of 18 he enlisted in the Army and served during the closing days of the civil war with Company "I", 17th Illinois Cavarly. He was raised in Waukegan by a well-known old fam, ily by the name of Strohbahr and when he enlisted in the army he used this name but later changed back to the correct name of Richards upon receiving his Honorable Discharge in 1866.
