**News of the Northshore Troops**  
Scouts look forward to two winter camps: Every scout would like to go to winter camp, but since this is not possible, every troop is given a chance to select two representatives to attend winter camp as the delegates of that troop. After they have had the time of their lives at the Cabin in the Woods four day camp or the Wilderness camp in Michigan, they will report back to their troop, telling of all the great times they have had.

Applications have been distributed to the scoutmasters of all Northshore troops, asking them to designate their troop representatives. If there are any vacancies on Dec. 15, they will be thrown open to a waiting list of individual scouts. The Cabin in the Woods camp which will be in charge of Carl McManus, assistant scout executive, will be limited to 24. And the Northshore delegation to Camp Wilderness, which is a joint camp with the Oak Park Area council, will be limited to 16 boys and will be in charge of Scout Executive Walter McPeck. Both camps open on Wednesday morning, Dec. 26.

**Big Chicago Jamboree**  
Northshore troops have a pretty full program and a wide variety of inter-troop activities, but on Friday

and Saturday, Dec. 14 and 15, they will have a chance to see a mammoth spectacle at the Coliseum—there gigantic scout jamboree, in which 14,900 scouts will take place.

Many Northshore troops plan to make a trip to this thrilling pageant—their weekly meeting, most of them going on Saturday evening. The pageant will depict the growth and development of scouting. You can imagine the thrill of seeing 14,000 boys winding back and forth in a great parade of scouting's pageant of progress across the entire Coliseum floor. **UPHOLDS PEDESTRIAN RIGHT OF WAY FIRST**

**DESPIT TRAFFIC SIGNS**

**United States District Court of Appeals in Important Decision, Reports Auto Club**

A court decision, of prime importance to all motorists, has just been handed down by the United States District Court of Appeals, upholding a pedestrian's right-of-way at a crossing despite traffic signal shifts, according to the legal department of the American Motorists' association, in co-operation with the Automobile club of Illinois.

The court holds that the pedestrian has the right-of-way until he reaches the opposite curb, without regard to the change of lights during his passage of the crossing. The decision is regarded by the association's legal department as just and is being called to the attention of the motoring public in order that the motorist may have full knowledge of his legal responsibility.

**Not His Fault**  
"When a pedestrian steps from a curb to cross the street, having a green signal with him, he does so by way of invitation and he cannot be charged with contributory neglect if the signal switches when he is in the street. Caught in this position, the obligation rests upon the motorist not only to observe the situation, but to wait until the crossing is clear," the decision declares. "Many automobile drivers," con-

tinued the court, "seem to imagine that with the shift of the signal they are given a clear right-of-way against intersecting traffic. In this belief they recklessly start their machines regardless of persons who are already on the intersection. It is the duty of drivers of machines to exercise greatest vigilance and care under such circumstances and not only to have their machines under control, but to stop and wait until pedestrians have had an opportunity to clear the crossing. Failure to observe these precautions constitutes negligence on the part of the driver, which, in case of accident, is chargeable to him," the court's decision concludes.

Mr. de Sauty will illustrate his talk with lantern slides, showing the very interesting steps taken in the production of a fine book.
