WANT FEDERAL AID IN ROAD BUILDING

QUESTIONNAIRE IS BASIS

Sent by Motorists Association to State Highway Body and Points Out Need of More Activity

Increased annual appropriations for Federal aid are necessary if highway construction is to keep abreast of automobile registrations, in the opinion of 35 of the 48 states, according to an analysis of questionnaires sent to State Highway Commissioners by the Legislative department of the American Motorists' association in co-operation with The Automobile Club of Illinois.

An affirmative answer was received to the following question from 35 of the states: "Do you favor an increase in the present amount of Federal-aid appropriation, the annual appropriation at the present time being \$75,000,000?" Replies from 13 states indicated that the state highway officials of those states do not favor increased Federal-aid.

Want Large Sum

In the opinion of those favoring additional Federal-aid, the consensus was that \$100,000,000 annually should be appropriated for this purpose. Replies from five states, however, placed the minimum of \$150,000,000 annually or twice the present authorization for 1929, 1930 and 1931 of \$75,000,000 annually.

But seven states were of the opinion that the Federal Government should contribute funds towards improvement of the secondary highway systems of the states, although practically all of the western states voiced their favor of the Oddie-Colton Bill which provides special funds for certain states having large tracts of public domain.

A total of \$733,200,000 has been appropriated to date by the Federal Government, under the Federal-aid program inaugurated in 1916.

JUDGE FORBY HEARS 1ST CRIMINAL CASE

Officiates in Circuit Court At Trial of Carmine Battino of Highwood

When the case of Carmine Battino, of Highwood, was called for trial Monday in the circuit court it marked the first appearance of City Judge Theodore Forby, of Zion, on the circuit court bench in a criminal case.

Early in the week he heard two civil suits at the request of Circuit Judge C. C. Edwards. Judge Edwards was able to take the bench Monday and Judge Forby, who has concurrent jurisdiction with him, agreed to hear the case.

Battino was arrested late in the summer by agents for the Chicago & North Western railway on a charge of breaking into freight cars at Highland Park.
