

URGE WIDENING OF STATE RADIAL ROADS

BLOOMINGTON GROUP ACTS

Adopts Resolutions Asking That State Take Up Matter; Need of More Lanes on Route No. 4 Is Seen

Added impetus was given the movement for the forty-foot radial roads in Illinois' highway system when 100 citizens of Bloomington recently adopted a resolution demanding that the next state administration find ways and means to effect the expansion.

The action was taken at a meeting attended by Mayor Val Simshauser, city officials and legislators. The speakers cited, as one reason why they favored the wider roads program, the large amount of traffic on State Highway No. 4, which runs from East St. Louis through Bloomington and Joliet to Chicago.

This road, although carrying more traffic than most state highways, is only sixteen feet wide in some instances. It is a prolific source of accidents in rainy weather and in the winter, when driving conditions are bad.

The conferees also gave their hearty support to the program of the Chicago Motor club, which calls for widening of seven radial roads, including Ill-4, out of Chicago to forty feet for a distance of 100 to 150 miles. That plan was presented at a meeting by J. E. Bulger, representing President Charles M. Hayes of the club, and J. J. Cavanaugh, downstate manager.

"Virtually all of these radial highways have been widened or proposed for widening from Chicago to the Cook county line," explained Mr. Bulger. "At the present time, motorists driving out of Chicago meet with a bottleneck when they leave Cook county, because most roads beyond the county are but eighteen feet wide. The congestion on these narrow roads extends at times as far from Chicago as 100 miles.

"The widening program, therefore, becomes a state problem. We are seeking a remedy, not five years hence but now. The governor has promised to ask the general assembly when it meets in January, to take the first steps to carry out this highly important task.

"There is more to this program than the mere widening. Grades should be separated at important rail crossings, as well as where main highways intersect."

NORTH SHORE LINE NEW LOOP STATION Establishes One at Madison Wabash Depot of Rapid Transit Lines

Station facilities of the Chicago North Shore and Milwaukee Railroad (North Shore Line) in the Chicago Loop have been increased with the establishment of the Madison-Wabash station of the Rapid Transit Lines as a regular stop for all northbound North Shore Line trains. Tickets to all points of the "Road of Service" between Chicago and Milwaukee may now be purchased at this station, said John R. Blackhall, General Manager, in announcing this added convenience for the traveling public.

"The addition of Madison-Wabash station to our loop facilities gives North Shore Line patrons three points in the downtown Chicago business district where they may board northbound trains," added Mr. Blackhall. "The others are the main out-bound loop station at 223 S. Wabash avenue and the Randolph-Wabash elevated station. The main in-bound loop station is the Wells street terminal of the Chicago Aurora and Elgin railroad, which is reached directly by overhead bridge from the Quincy-Wells elevated station. Persons arriving in the Chicago Loop from north shore cities may also leave North shore Line trains at any other rapid transit station on Wells or Van Buren street."

All scouts are practicing hard to learn what to do in case of fire, fractures, cuts, drowning, fainting, suffocation, shocks, etc.
