

### MANY ENROLLED FOR \$1,000 MEMBERSHIPS

#### 1933 FAIR PROGRESSES

#### Million Dollars to Be Raised By Securing Thousand Founders' Checks Gen. Davis Says

Chicago World's Fair workers, under the direction of General Abel Davis, vice president of the Chicago Title and Trust company and Stuyvesant Peabody, head of the Consumers company, are busy securing enrollments in the \$1,000 founder membership campaign announced Sunday by Rufus C. Dawes, president of the Centennial.

So many applications have been received for the \$1,000 founder memberships that it has been decided to raise \$1,000,000 for the fair by admitting 1,000 to that status instead of selling only 100 of them, Mr. Dawes said.

### STYLE INNOVATIONS IN NEW PONTIAC 6

#### Fisher Body Corporation Being Enlarged to Take Care of 1929 Demands

Pontiac, Mich., Dec. 20 — Many style innovations in the new Pontiac Six, to be introduced around the first of the coming year, as well as expanded body plant facilities to meet the demand for the 1929 line, were announced here today by the Oakland Motor Car company.

Looking toward record sales of the new car, the Fisher Body corporation plant here has been enlarged by a several-million dollar development now virtually completed and ready for production on the new Pontiac Six body types.

Expansion projects include a new stamping plant to turn out metal parts used in the composite steel and wood construction of Fisher bodies, enlargement of the power plant and construction of a storage building to make way for more extended body assembly operations. In view of these changes, Fisher officials estimate that next year the plant will have a capacity of 1,500 bodies a day.

Stepping up of the Fisher body plant capacity parallels expansion projects also under way at the modern Oakland-Pontiac plant, which in 1929 will have a peak volume of more than 35,000 cars as against an esti-

mated output this year of 265,000 units.

Location of the new stamping plant adjacent to the Fisher factory in which all Pontiac Six bodies are built also follows the centralization plan inaugurated by President A. R. Glancy, of the Oakland company, in 1926, when he started construction of a complete manufacturing unit on the edge of town.

Early in 1929, when the new Oakland-Pontiac foundry now under construction begins turning out castings, all major parts used in manufacturing Oakland and Pontiac sixes will be built in factories owned by the Oakland company and the Fisher corporation, with all units conveniently grouped to cut down transportation costs.

The Fisher and Oakland-Pontiac factory sites adjoin, the two manufacturing units being linked by a quarter-mile long conveyor through which compressed air propels Pontiac Six bodies direct from the Fisher body assembly line to the Pontiac car assembly building.
