

SI. MAYER SPEAKS FOR LICENSE LAW

WOULD REMEDY ABUSES

Increasing Demand for Statute to Regulate Drunken and Other Unfit Driver of Motor Cars

With both stupid and reckless driving taking an increasingly heavy toll in human lives, and the maiming and injuring of thousands for the rest of their lives, and the causing of a large amount of property damage, public opinion throughout the nation is insistent upon the elimination of the careless, wanton few to whom can be attributed most of the blame for what is regarded as becoming a more and more intolerable situation. Demand everywhere is growing for the enactment of full and effective drivers' license laws as the most forceful means of bringing order out of chaos, but the law must be rigidly enforced.

First among the national motoring organizations to step forth and call for the universal application of this remedy is the American Motorists' association with a statement which quotes its vice-president, Si. Mayer, also president of the Automobile club of Illinois, as saying that "no sound progress can be made toward traffic safety and toward the scourging from our public highways of the criminally-minded motorists who are making them paths of death and disorder until every community has upon its statute books a drivers' license law."

Law Is Essential

Such a law is an absolute essential Mr. Mayer declares, because, he points out, it gives to the central authority a definite and positive check upon every motorist in the community. "An adequate drivers' license law, the kind that should be in force in every state in the country, first of all makes it obligatory for prospective motorists to take an examination upon the regulations and upon automobile operation."

"That means that no person would be permitted to take a car out upon the streets and highways unless he or she had a working knowledge of the regulations which have been set up for the safe and expeditious movement of traffic and also could demonstrate to a duly constituted authority that he or she was fully capable of handling a motor vehicle with all the safe efficiency demanded in this day of heavy and complicated traffic.

Tests Not Difficult

"Now, these tests need not be difficult. Any person, sound in mind and physically qualified, able to read the English language and distinguish colors, can pass them without trouble. In the states where such a law has been promulgated, it has not in any way discouraged the use of the automobile. On the contrary, use has been fostered because these states and communities have been able to rid themselves of potential trouble-makers and quickly descend upon chronic violators not only of the traffic or criminal codes but of the laws of common decency and fairplay."

The the drivers' license law has proved of inestimable value in aiding the cause of traffic safety in those places where it is in vigorous operation is emphasized by Mr. Mayer who says that "statements by traffic authorities and motorists themselves in every center where such a law is in force reveal it to be an indispensable part of the safety movement."

"To list the names of the leaders of traffic though who favor the drivers' license law is to read the roster of the most important men in the field, and the traffic authorities of every state and community which has found the statute vital. The American Motorists association and the Automobile club of Illinois regards the universal enactment of drivers' license laws as a matter of paramount importance, and cannot urge with too much emphasis the need for the complete cooperation of all interested persons and organizations to the end that they be placed upon the statute books.

Active Demand Grows

"In many communities, especially during the last, there has developed an active demand for drivers' license law, based upon growing recklessness within their own limits and betterment in places which have succeeded in passing effective licensing regulations. With this demand the American Motorists association and the Automobile club of Illinois is in the firmest accord, and our nation-wide organization's help in every possible way is pledged to that constructive end.

"Growing wantonness, growing recklessness, growing disrespect for law and the rights of others all demand action and vigorous action," says Mr. Mayer. "These destructive forces cannot be fought with any but the most efficient and the most forceful gives protection to every honest motorist and places a defensive weapon in the hand of the community. Without it, the battle will continue to be a losing one.

"With a drivers' license law in effect the great goal of traffic safety can be brought immeasurably nearer accomplishment.

Automatic oil burning furnaces, dishwashers, dishdryers, automatic

iceboxes, washing and ironing machines, electric food choppers, egg-beaters, cream whippers, kitchen cabinets—these are the modern weapons of emancipation, she says.

Escalloped Cauliflower and Ham
Scald 1 pint milk, add 2 tablespoons butter, seasoning and 3 tablespoons quick-cooking tapioca and cook 15 minutes. Put layer of mixture in buttered baking dish, then layer of cooked cauliflower and chopped ham and sprinkle with buttered crumbs. Bake in moderate oven.

Chocolate Walnut Jelly
Chop 1/2 cup English walnuts and 1/2 dozen figs. Bring pint of milk to boiling point, and dissolve in it a package of chocolate flavored gelatin. When beginning to harden, add nuts and fruit. Mold and serve with cream.

NOTICE OF SALE OF PUBLIC LAND

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that on Monday, September 18, 1928, an ordinance was passed unanimously by the Council of the City of Highland Park, authorizing the sale of the following described property, to-wit:

Lot 19 (19), twenty (20) and twenty-one (21) in Block 107, in the City of Highland Park, Lake County, Illinois.

The said City of Highland Park now hereby offers for sale the said property hereinabove described.

The said property is a parcel of land now being used by said city as a city hall site. The same is occupied by the city hall and fire and police stations and stands on the City of Highland Park. The ownership of said property vests in the City of Highland Park.

Bids on the sale of said property will be received and considered by the Council of said City of Highland Park at the regular meeting to be held in the city hall of the City of Highland Park, Lake County, Illinois, on Monday, the 28th day of January A. D. 1929, at 7:45 o'clock P. M., at which time the bids will be opened and considered. All bids shall be made on the following terms and conditions, which are the terms and conditions provided by the Council for the sale of the property hereinabove described:

1. The buyer shall make a cash payment of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars upon the purchase and upon the acceptance of his bid. The balance of said purchase price shall be due and payable at the time when possession

shall be delivered by the city to the buyer.

2. The city shall pay to the buyer as rental for the use of the building from the date of delivery of possession to the date of delivery of possession the sum of \$20.00 per annum.
3. Possession shall be delivered by the city to the buyer as soon as the new city hall hereinabove mentioned shall be ready for occupancy by said city.
4. Bids will be received for the property as hereinabove described as one piece, and also in two parcels, one for Lot 19 as one parcel, and one for Lots 20 and 21 as one parcel, in which case the down payment shall be Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars on each parcel, and the terms the same as hereinabove set forth.
5. If additional funds are needed by the city in connection with the construction of the said proposed city hall, it shall be one of the terms of the sale that the purchaser will furnish such additional funds from time to time up to and including the total amount of his bid as the same may be requested by said city, and that as such payments are made, the rental hereinabove mentioned on the site hereinabove described shall be increased so as to amount to six (6) per cent per annum on the amount paid in by the purchaser on said purchase price.
6. The purchaser shall take title sub-

ject to taxes for the year in which the purchase is consummated; and

just also to questions of survey and right of claim of parties in possession, if any.

All bids shall be accompanied by a certified check for Twenty-five Hundred (\$2500.00) Dollars. All bids shall be sealed and deposited with the city clerk for presentation to the Council at said meeting. Said described property will be sold to the highest and best bidder therefor upon the terms hereinabove set forth, either in one or two parcels, as in the terms herein fully described, and provided that said bid or bids shall be accepted by a three-fourths vote of the members of the Council of the City of Highland Park. Said ordinance provides that the Council may by a majority vote reject any and all bids and it may adjourn consideration of said bids to the next regular meeting of said Council. The said ordinance also provides that in the event of the acceptance by the Council of the bid or bids for said property, the Mayor and City Clerk are authorized and directed to execute and deliver to the purchaser a contract under the seal of the city of Highland Park embodying the terms and conditions in said ordinance set forth.

Said ordinance as passed on Monday, September 18, 1928, is on file in the office of the City Clerk in the City Hall, and is open to public inspection.
