ZION IS DENIED RADIO PERMIT

BY FEDERAL COMMISSION

Station WCBD Will Continue Fight to Restore Broadcasting Old Wave Length of 345 Meters

Application of the city of Zion for a permit to operate the Zion radio station, WCBD on its old wave length of 345 meters has been denied by the federal radio commission at Washington, D. C., it was admitted last week by General Overseer Wilbur Glenn Voliva. Official announcement of this refusal has reached Zion.

In denying the application, according to Mr. Voliva, the federal commission announced that the matter would be given further considera-

"Does this mean the fight has been lost," he was asked.

"Not at all," was the emphatic re-"We have just begun to fight. Our attorneys are working on the case and we are confident of victory. Yes. I will make it even strongerwe are going to win 100 per cent."

Under the recent reallocation established by the federal radio commission, the Zion station was prohibited from broadcasting at night and was placed on a much lower wave length.

The application filed by the city of Zion asked that the station be restored to its old wave length and also asked for permission to broadcast programs on Sunday and Thursday nights, a total of 12 hours a week. Since the reallocation occurred the station has been silent.

Radio station WCBD represents an investment to Zion people of approximately \$200,000. Unless a more favorable wave length can be obtained, together with permission for broadcasting at night the effort will be to practically junk the expensive apparatus.

Thousands of letters and telegrams from radio listeners all over the country were filed with the federal radio commission when it was learned that discrimination had been shown the Zion station, all voicing a protest and asking that the station be restored to its rights.

Overseer Voliva, Judge Theodore Forby, J. H. DePew, veteran announcer, and John D. Thomas, program director of the station, all made a personal visit to the federal commission in Washington to present their case. At the time they were informed that their application would be taken under advisement.

In Lake Forest Green Bay road is a boulevard and is known as "Millionaire Road," while up to date in Highland Park Green Bay road has been nothing but a truck road. We cannot think of any reason why Highland Park should lag behind all the other north shore suburbs in providing a second boulevard running north and south.

There is another reason why the establishment of Green Bay road as a boulevard would add prestige to the City of Highland Park. Nowhere along the north shore is there as beautiful a panoramic view as that looking west over the Skokie Valley in traversing Green Bay road throughout parts of Highland Park. If truck traffic were eliminated so that passenger traffic would feel safe, the fame of this beautiful drive would add much to the prestige of the city.
