

HIGHWOOD-MAN DIES OF CRASH INJURIES

**G. Roselli, 24, Hurt in Accident
Thursday Night; Succumbs
at Lake Forest**

Injuries received when his automobile overturned while traveling at a high rate of speed on McKinley avenue at the Sacred Heart academy in Lake Forest, Thursday night, resulted in the death of Guisippe Roselli, 24 years old, 209 North avenue, Highwood, in the Alice Home hospital, Saturday afternoon.

Roselli suffered a fracture of the skull when he was thrown from his machine against a tree. He was unconscious from the time of the accident until his death.

On Way to Waukegan

Believed to have been headed for Waukegan Roselli left Highwood at about 11 o'clock Thursday night. He was driving at a high rate of speed when he reached the turn in front of the school on McKinley road. The automobile struck the curb and turned over.

John Walker and Herbert Sohlen, both of 840 Taylor street, Highland Park, passing the scene of the accident shortly after it occurred placed Roselli in their machine and took him to the Alice Home hospital.

Treatment Delayed

Rendered delirious from the injury to his head, Roselli fought all efforts of physicians to attend him. As a result no X-ray pictures could be made of his injury until 24 hours after the accident. This was followed immediately by an operation.

An inquest was conducted by Dr. J. L. Taylor at the Wenban Funeral establishment, Lake Forest, on Saturday evening.

Roselli was single. It is believed that all of his relatives live in Italy.

The automobile, a Ford touring car was badly damaged in the crash.

"To Chief of Police:

"I alone am responsible for this act and I am not insane nor temporarily deranged. Am of perfectly sound mind. I have no insurance, but have saved some \$800 in the Highland Park State bank and have ten shares of North Shore Gas Co. (\$1,000.00). The papers are in safety box in Highland Park bank.

"This money is to be used for expense of our disposition. It is my wish that the caskets be most reasonably priced and that our bodies be cremated, the children's as well as mine, and our ashes to be buried in my father's and brother's graves, the children's in father's and mine in my brother's, if his wife will permit it.

"I don't think my husband or anyone else should have the right to oppose. I want no trouble for anyone. Flowers are to be strictly omitted. No one cared enough about us to bring us one; so they needn't go to any expense after we're gone."
