The Clayton Fehr family have purchased the Albert Hagi home on Osterman avenue.

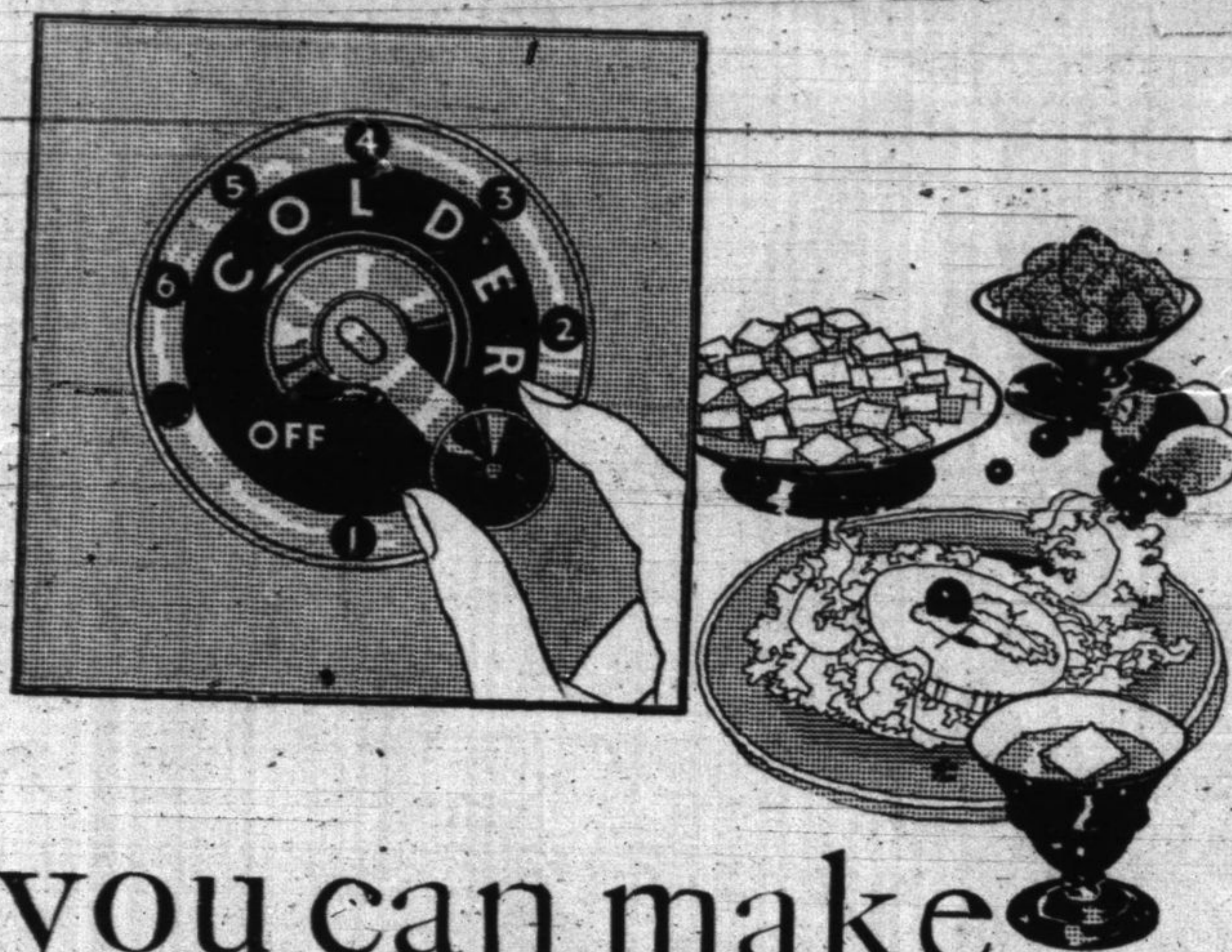
Mary Frances Anderson is very ill at her home on Grand avenue.
