The Board of Appeals shall not be required to return, in response to such writ of the court, the original papers acted upon by the Board, but it shall be sufficient to return certified or sworn copies thereof or such portions thereof as may be called for by such writ. The return of the Board required by such writ must concisely set forth such other facts as may be pertinent and material to show the grounds of the decision appealed from, and such return must be verified.

**AN ORDINANCE CALLING A GENERAL BI-ANNUAL ELECTION FOR TWO COMMISSIONERS OF THE HIGHLAND PARK EAST PARK DISTRICT, COUNTY OF LAKE AND STATE OF ILLINOIS.**  
 BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE HIGHLAND PARK EAST PARK DISTRICT, LAKE COUNTY, ILLINOIS:

**SECTION 1.** That the general bi-annual election of the Highland Park East Park District be, and the same is hereby, ordered to be held in the Highland Park East Park District, in the County of Lake and State of Illinois, on the first Tuesday in April, A. D. 1929, to-wit, April 2, 1929, between the hours of 7:00 o'clock in the morning and 5:00 o'clock in the afternoon of said day, for the purpose of electing the following officers of the said Highland Park East Park District, to-wit:

Two Commissioners for the full term of six (6) years each.

**SECTION 2.** That each of the election precincts of said Highland Park East Park District as described and created in and by an ordinance, entitled, "An Ordinance creating and defining election precincts in the Highland Park East Park District," passed on the Fifth day of March, 1929, and approved the Fifth day of March, 1929, be and they are hereby, respectively, declared and created election districts or precincts for said election; that the voting places in and for each of the respective precincts shall be as follows:

First Precinct—Office of the Highland Park East Park District at 543 Central Avenue.

**SECTION 4.** That the Secretary of the Highland Park East Park District be, and he is hereby, directed to provide for the giving of notice of said election and conducting the same as provided by law and notify the Clerks and Judges of Election.

**SECTION 5.** That at said election the polls shall be opened at 7:00 o'clock in the morning and shall be closed at 5:00 o'clock in the evening of the first Tuesday of April, A. D. 1929.

**AN ORDINANCE CREATING AND DEFINING ELECTION PRECINCTS IN THE HIGHLAND PARK EAST PARK DISTRICT.**  
 BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE HIGHLAND PARK EAST PARK DISTRICT, COUNTY OF LAKE AND STATE OF ILLINOIS:

**SECTION 1.** That the Highland Park East Park District and the territory embraced within its limits be and the same is hereby divided into four (4) election precincts and the same are hereby fixed as hereinafter provided that is to say:

The First Precinct shall consist of all the territory and area embraced within the following boundaries, to-wit: That portion of Highland Park East Park District which lies west of the center line of the easterly right of way of the Chicago & Northwestern Railway Company, east of the west line of Sections 10-15-22-27, Township 43 North Range 12 East and North of the North line of Sections 34-35-36, Township 43 North Range 12 East except that portion of the Subdivision known as the First Addition to Ravinia Highlands, Highland Park, Illinois, lying North of the North line of Section 36, Township 43 North Range 12 East.

The Second Precinct shall consist of all the territory and area embraced within the following boundaries, to-wit: All that portion of the Highland Park East Park District which lies East of the center line of the easterly right of way of the Chicago & Northwestern Railway Company and north-westerly of the center line of Beech Street, in said Highland Park East Park District.

The Third Precinct shall consist of all the territory and area embraced within the following boundaries, to-wit: All that portion of Highland Park East Park District which lies South of the North line of Sections 33-34-35-36, Township 43 North Range 12 East and that portion of Section 25, Township 43 North Range 12 East lying Southeasterly of the center line of Beech Street and North-easterly of the center line of the Easterly right of way of the Chicago & Northwestern Railway Company and including that portion of the Subdivision known as the First Addition to Ravinia Highlands, Highland Park, Lake County, Illinois, lying North of the North line of Section 36 Township 43 North Range 12 East.

The Fourth Precinct shall consist of all the territory and area embraced within the following boundaries, to-wit: All that portion of the Highland Park East Park District which lies South of the North line of Section 28, Township 43 North Range 12 East and West of the East line of Section 28, Township 43 North Range 12 East.

**SECTION 2.** All Ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

**SECTION 3.** This ordinance shall be in force and effect from and after its passage.

**Abbott Laboratories to Enlarge Big Plant**

Construction on the factory building which will serve as an addition to the plant of the Abbott Laboratories, North Chicago will be carried out this year, according to information coming from the offices of that corporation, Waukegan papers report.

The building which will be erected at a cost to exceed \$100,000 and which will represent an expense of almost twice that amount when it is equipped for manufacture will be erected along the same lines of architecture as that of the other buildings that make up this massive industry.

**Manufacture Drug Products**

The new building will be devoted to the manufacture of general pharmaceutical products which have been issued under the trademarks of the John T. Milliken company of St. Louis which was purchased more than a year ago by the Abbott Laboratories.

Erection of the new building will mean the enlargement of the force of employes of the company.

**Questions and Answers**

Q—I have been told that the motion picture industry was started in Illinois. If so, where? When? And by whom?

L. A. B., Kankakee.  
 A—The first motion picture film was made in Waukegan in 1895 by El Amet now living in Long Beach, Calif. The first motion picture show ever given was held in the opera house in Waukegan. Waukegan boys and girls were the first persons ever to appear in motion pictures and the first man who ever "made a million" out of pictures was George K. Spoor, of Waukegan, now of Chicago.

Q—Can you tell me the size of the average farm in Illinois? What is the average investment per farm? How does this compare with other states?

J. G., Waukegan.  
 A—The average farm in Illinois is estimated to be 136.2 acres in size of which 110 acres is tillable. The average investment per farm in Illinois is higher per acre than in any other state.

Q—Can you tell me how many professional schools there are in Illinois and what they teach?

C. E. D., Bloomington.  
 A—There are in Illinois eighteen theological schools, fourteen law schools, ten medical schools, five teaching dentistry, five pharmacy and three veterinary medicine.

Q—Can you tell me how many mineral deposits are worked in Illinois? And what is the value of their output?

H. H. H., Rock Island.  
 A—More than nine hundred deposits, classed as mineral, are worked in Illinois and the output is more than \$1,000,000 for each working day. Among the leading minerals produced are coal, petroleum, clays, building stone, lead, zinc, fluorspar, tripoli, fullers earth, sand, cement, etc. These are the things, please note, that cities and civilizations are built of and so very important.

Q—I saw a statement printed recently to the effect that Illinois has more telephones in operation than in all the continent of South America. Is that a fact?

 A—Telephone men tell us that there are more phones in operation in Illinois than on the continents of South America, Africa and Asia all combined. There is a telephone in Illinois to every 4.4 persons. The average for the United States is one to every 7.6 persons.

Q—What percentage of Illinois roads are paved with concrete?

J. K., Streator.  
 A—Illinois has 97,200 miles of public highways and of these approximately 7,700 miles are laid with concrete slab. This does not take into account the streets of cities.

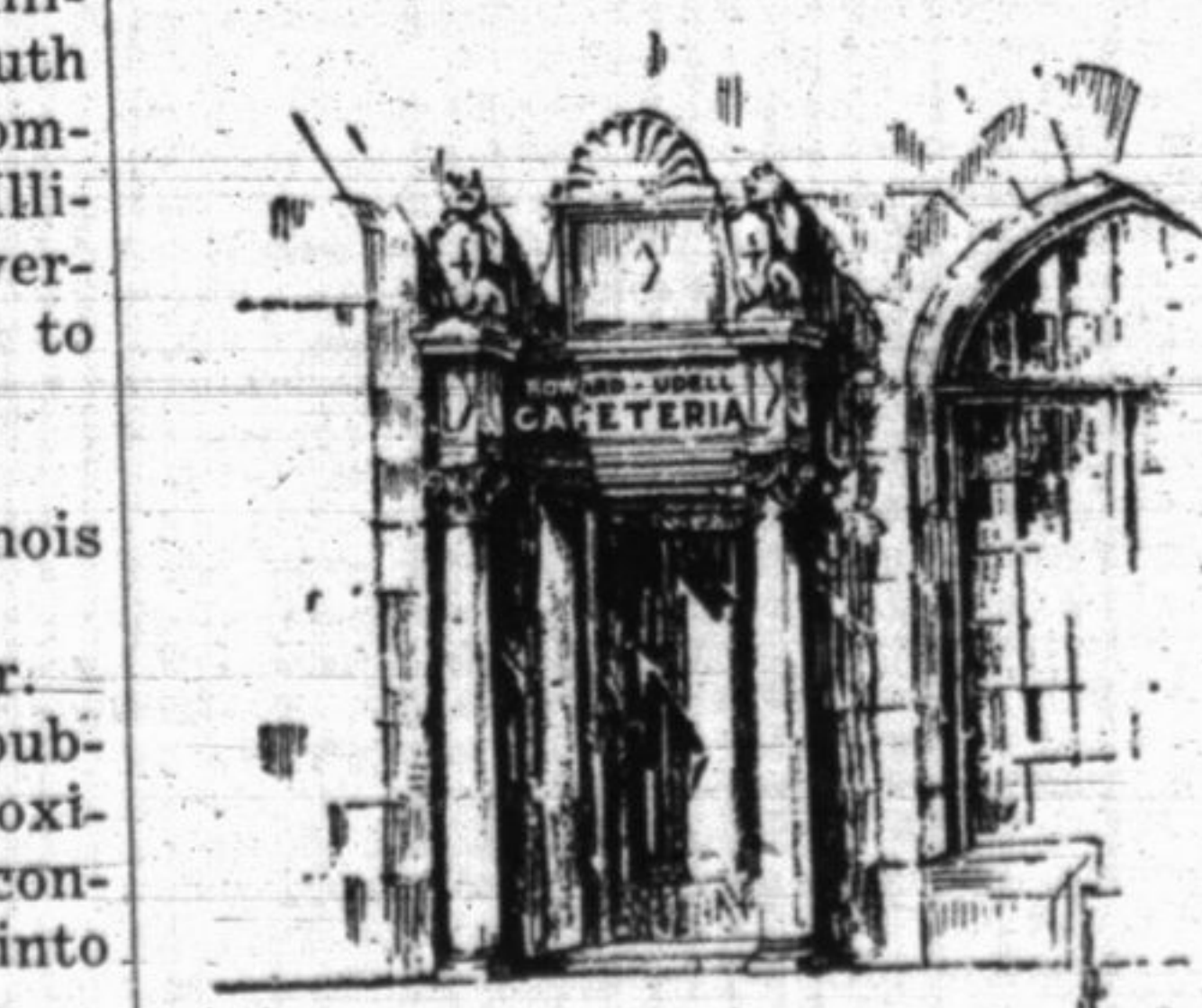
