 West of Lake Forest**

Fred D. Sadler of the firm of Sadler, Patton & Co., Chicago brokers, has purchased from Andrew J. The property in Vernon township is situated on an unnamed road a half-mile south of the former J. Ogden Armour residence, on Melody farm. It lies within the area bounded by Town Line and Everett roads, Milwaukee avenue and Waukegan road, according to the real estate news of the Chicago Tribune. The property is known as Orchard Hill Estates. It will be divided into five and 10 acre tracts and marketed by Milledge D. Bullard & Co. Mr. Bullard was formerly associated with W. H. He also stressed the needs of these hospitals for the future, for many new mental cases are developing daily among the veterans of the World war.

Robert Gullic of North Chicago suggested the organization of the Eighth District Forum at which several members meet to discuss matters of National importance. The forum was organized, and it is planned to secure prominent speakers familiar with these National and Civic projects to address the group, who in turn will familiarize themselves with conditions, and be able to explain matters, to groups or individuals who are not familiar with the various subjects.

**The Calendar of Plant Feeding
 THIS MONTH**

1. LAWN: As soon as grass shows green, or any time thereafter, apply plant food.
2. FLOWERS: Work plant food into soil before seeding; or for perennials, as soon as plants appear. For early large and richly colored blooms make later feedings.
3. VEGETABLES: Work plant food into the soil before seeding. Later feedings will hasten maturity, increase yields.
4. SHRUBS, TREES: Apply plant food any time after leaves appear.
