

Storm Damage Here Is Not Great; Elsewhere

The heavy rain storm of last Sunday did much damage up and down the north shore, but city officials report that no serious damage was done on the beach here. At Evanston and other points south there was considerable loss. A heavy storm of hail in the afternoon caused some damage here especially to Fritz Bahr's greenhouses, in which a large number of panes of glass were broken.

South of Zion where a creek passed under a culvert on Sheridan road about 40 feet of the road with the bridge was washed out, and traffic on that section of Sheridan road is being detoured until the damage is repaired which may be two months or more, according to reports from Waukegan.

Silber and Witt Are Elected to Park Board

In the Highland Park East Park district election, held Tuesday, for the selection of two members of the park board for the full term of six years, both the candidates, Fred Silber and Clarence H. Witt, present members, were re-elected without opposition. About 105 votes were cast in the election. Both these officials have served the district well and faithfully in the past and that their services have been satisfactory is indicated by the lack of opposition at this election.

Display First Water Pipe Laid in Chicago

A cross section of the first water pipe installed in Chicago today was placed on display in the Lake County Fuel & Supply company, Waukegan, by Harvey Miltimore. The "pipe" which was made by drilling out white pine poles, was laid in the Michigan avenue and Lake street district, in 1842 by Ira Miltimore, a brother of Harvey Miltimore's great-grandfather. Two miles of pipe and two tanks, with a capacity of 1,250 barrels each, were constructed by the elder Miltimore for \$25,000. The "pipe" is in an excellent state of preservation.

Proclamation Warns of Unmuzzled Dogs

The following proclamation has been issued by Mayor Benjamin F. Lewis regarding the running at large of unmuzzled dogs:

Dog Owners Take Notice — The running at large of unmuzzled dogs between Monday, April 1, 1929, and Tuesday, Dec. 31, 1929, is hereby declared a nuisance. Any person owning, keeping, harboring or maintaining any dog without muzzle during this period will be liable to a fine of not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$25.00.

The city marshal is ordered to seize and impound unmuzzled dogs. Impounded dogs, if not redeemed according to law, will be destroyed. March 27, 1929.—Benjamin F. Lewis, Mayor.

Motion for New Trial in Keehn Damage Suit

Motion for a new trial for Mrs. Roy D. Keehn of Chicago, a summer resident in Lake county, will be argued April 6 before Circuit Judge Claire C. Edwards with Attorneys James G. Welch and Edward Woods, her counsel, contending that the judgment of \$7,500 assessed against her for an automobile accident, was exorbitant.

The motion was made last week, after a jury decided that Mrs. Keehn, whose husband is a major-general in the Illinois National Guard, was to blame for an accident in which Mrs. Emma Drecoll, of Lake Villa, was injured August 8, 1928, on the Lake Villa road.

A second suit, that of Herman, son of Mrs. Drecoll, is pending. In this action \$10,000 is sought.

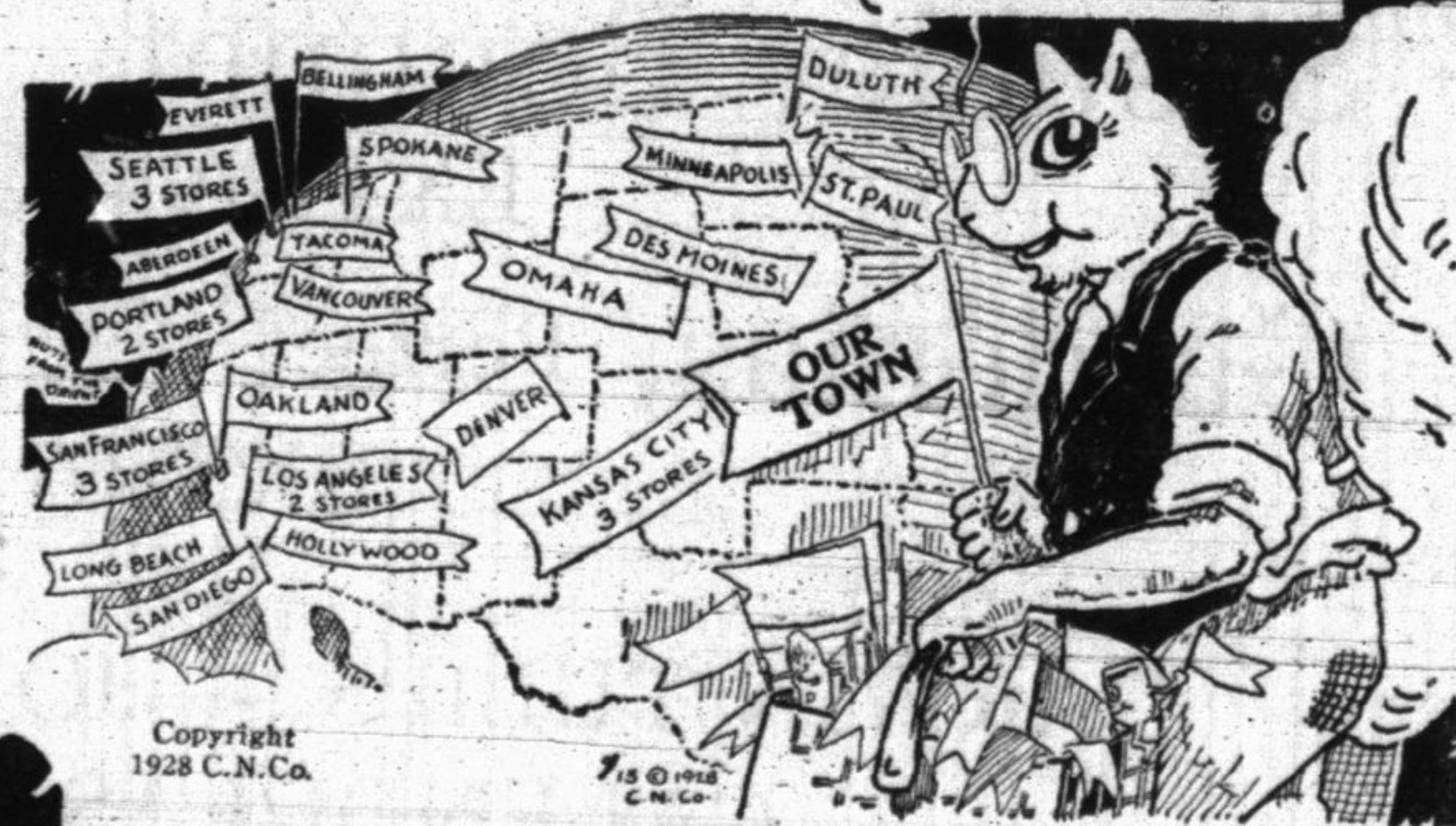
