
Gateman or Device at Crossing Up in Court

The decision upholds the power of

a city to determine in what manner dangerous grade crossings within its limits shall be protected, according to the legal department of the American Motorists association, in co-operation with the Automobile club of Illinois.

The ordinance involved in the decision was passed by the city of Memphis, Tenn., 40 years ago and required the presence of flagmen swingflags in daytime, and lighted lanterns in the night time at all railroad crossings. Without regard for the ordinance, one railroad company removed its crossing watchmen and substituted in their places modern mechanical signaling apparatus. An autoist was killed at one of the crossings and the carrier's violation of the ordinance was urged as the proximate cause of the accident.


