Deerfield. At the present time there are 15 public improvements pending, some under contract, some to be let and others awaiting the confirmation of the court. No public improvements have been installed unless petitioned for by the property owners and the petition presented for action to the village board. Other important matters, which were accomplished are the installation of the water tank and the building of the pump house, which gave the people an adequate supply of water, fire protection and reduction in insurance rates; the paving of the old obligations of the village; A-1 credit rating established for Deerfield; the widening of Waukegan road in the business district and the installation of ornamental lights in that section; building line for the erection of any new buildings in the business zone; organization of public service departments to operate efficiently; stop and go signals at Waukegan road and Deerfield avenue for the safety of pedestrians and school children; larger and better quarters for the postoffice; bookkeeping system to insure the accurate handling of records and finance; the desirability and high market price for public improvement bonds; the saving of interest through recalling bonds before maturity.

Mr. Hood has served faithfully and fearlessly and is a man of action not promises. His forcefulness and ability go hand in hand for the successful administration of public business. His knowledge of the laws governing villages is a big asset. For instance, few stop to realize that the engineers of the village are paid only for the improvements which are installed, all other work is gratis, such as preparing an atlas of Deerfield, a system of house numbering and items of this sort.
