Coach Rothacker Popular at Springfield College

Former Coach Rothacker of the Deerfield-Shields high school is as popular as ever at Springfield college, according to Principal Sandwick of the high school who has just returned from the east.

He is working hard as usual, and meeting with excellent success. In football last autumn Mr. Rothacker's team played their first game with Harvard, but the "big crimson" team so greatly overmatched Coach Rothacker's in weight, that he lost his two stars with injuries in the first five minutes of play and found his whole team more or less crippled for the start of the season.

Mr. Rothacker has charge of swimming and track in addition to football. Springfield college is having excellent success in these two sports. There are about four hundred students at the college, of whom two hundred fifty are in the coaching school and available for athletics. A surprisingly large number enter Springfield with no previous football experience, though basketball has usually been well developed among them before coming there.

Among the Deerfield-Shields graduates who have gone to Springfield, Harold Gordon is outstanding. He was one of the college's leaders while there and has been a successful coach since graduating.
