RE-ELECT MILLARD HEAD OF PARK BOARD

Has Served as President for
Ten Years; Other Officers;
Brief History

At the meeting of the Park Board held on Wednesday, April 10th, the following officers for the ensuing year were elected by Commissioners Everett L. Millard, Fred D. Silber, Milton J. Hardacre, L. R. Rigdon and C. H. Witt:

President, Everett L. Millard.
Secretary, Edw. M. Laing.
Treasurer, Chas. F. Grant.

President Millard has been a member of the Park Board for 13 years and its president for the past 10 years, having succeeded Mr. Cushing. He is a well known, and highly respected citizen; also he is president of the North Shore Gas company. It was largely through his efforts that the Park District was organized in July 1909, although he did not become a member until 1916. Mr. S. M. Millard, his father, was instrumental in the first attempt to organize a park district in Highland Park which was however unsuccessful.

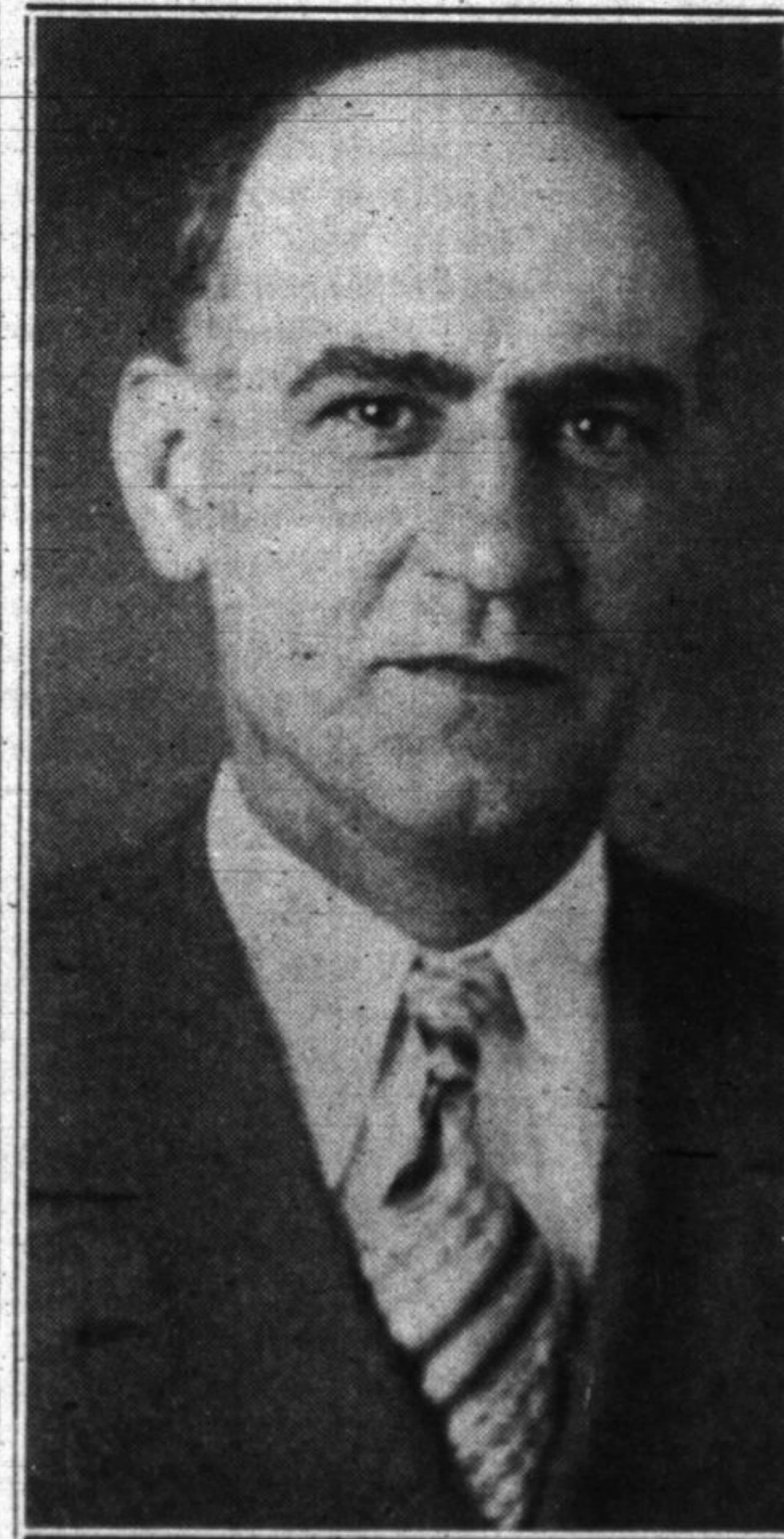
The course is in good condition and is being enjoyed by many. 216 registered for play on Sunday in spite of the cold wind blowing.

"Lilies of the Field" to Be Given
in Highland Park and
Lake Forest

The North Shore Theatre guild is announcing, through its production department, that its fourth and last production of the season will be of "Lilies of the Field," to be presented in early May. The play will be produced by the guild's regular staff, David Owen, director; Richard Woellhaf, technical director; and John Allen Stewart, business manager.

"Lilies of the Field" was written by John Hastings Turner, an Englishman of whom little information is at hand. The play, which is English comedy in three-acts, light and near-farcical in treatment, had its premiere in London, with success, and has had American production by Pasadena's energetic Community Playhouse. There is no record of its having played elsewhere in the United States.

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Results Of School Elections In Local Districts April 13

In the several school elections here on Saturday the candidates regularly nominated by petition were elected without opposition, according to the unofficial reports. Peter J. Duffy was elected school trustee.

In the Deerfield-Shields township high school district, No. 113, George T. Rogers of Lake Forest was re-elected member of the board for the full term of three years, without opposition. A total of 204 votes were cast, 23 in Highland Park, 14 in Deerfield and 167 in Lake Forest.

In District No. 107, George E. Bliss was re-elected president of the board of education and Mrs. Frances C. Creigh and R. Arthur Wood members of the board for the full term of three years, and Howell Murray member to fill vacancy. Each of the candidates named received 28 votes.

In District No. 108, Carleton M. Vail was re-elected president of the board and Delmer M. Blasier and George W. Carr, were re-elected members to succeed themselves. The vote was as follows: Vail, 43; Blasier, 44; Carr, 44; there was no opposition.
