## Progress For Year Shown In Statement Of School Dist. 108

On another page of this issue of the Press will be found a statement of School District No. 108 for the fiscal year ended March 31, 1929. This statement shows that a great deal has been done in the way of enlarging school houses, building of a new school building and addition to school grounds.

This building program to supply necessary facilities for education in this district was made possible only through a large bond issue authorized by the voters in pursuance to an amendment to the school revenue law doubling the bonding powers of school districts for a short time, and which amendment was revoked June 30, 1928.

It is noted that the Ravinia school auditorium addition, begun in 1927, has been completed; that the Lincoln school addition, begun in the fall of 1928, is completed; that the Braeside school building is nearing completion and will be ready for use in September of this year.

A new site was purchased for the Braeside school; an addition of two acres was bought for the Ridge school grounds, and a future site for a school building was purchased on Clavey road, which in due time will be improved with a school house to provide educational facilities for that section of the district which is now being built up.

In all of the school house additions completed this year and in the new Braeside school building now nearing completion, the school district was fortunate, according to George Vetter, secretary of the board of education, in having had an architect and contractors who co-operated with the board of education both in the matter of economy and in the construction of good buildings well suited to the requirements of the district.

## NEW UPTOWN FIRE STATION PLANNED

**City Council Authorizes Con-  
tract with Architect; Other  
Proceedings of Session**

At the regular session of the city council on Monday evening, initial steps were taken in the direction of the construction of a new uptown fire station to replace the one now in use on the lot recently sold by the city, when the mayor and city clerk were authorized to execute a contract with Emory Stanford Hall, Bisbee & Rhenisch to do the architectural work for such a building, to be located on Lot 5, Block 9, City of Highland Park, which is the old Ugolini lot on Green Bay road, adjacent to the site of the new city water standpipe. The proceedings were as follows:

### Ravinia Fire Station

A communication from the Wisconsin society of Chicago requesting permission to place markers along Green Bay road through Highland Park was referred to Commissioner Brown.

Commissioner Reay moved that the Zion institutions and industries be allowed a refund of \$3.00 upon the cancellation of electrical permit No. 1354. The motion prevailed.

### Change Street Name

Commissioner Gourley moved to pass an ordinance changing the names of certain streets in the city. This refers to streets in new subdivisions where confusion was probable owing to similarity to names of other streets. The motion prevailed.

The report of Herman Schwery, justice of the peace, showing collection of fines to April 1, 1929 in the amount of \$526.00 was ordered placed on file.
