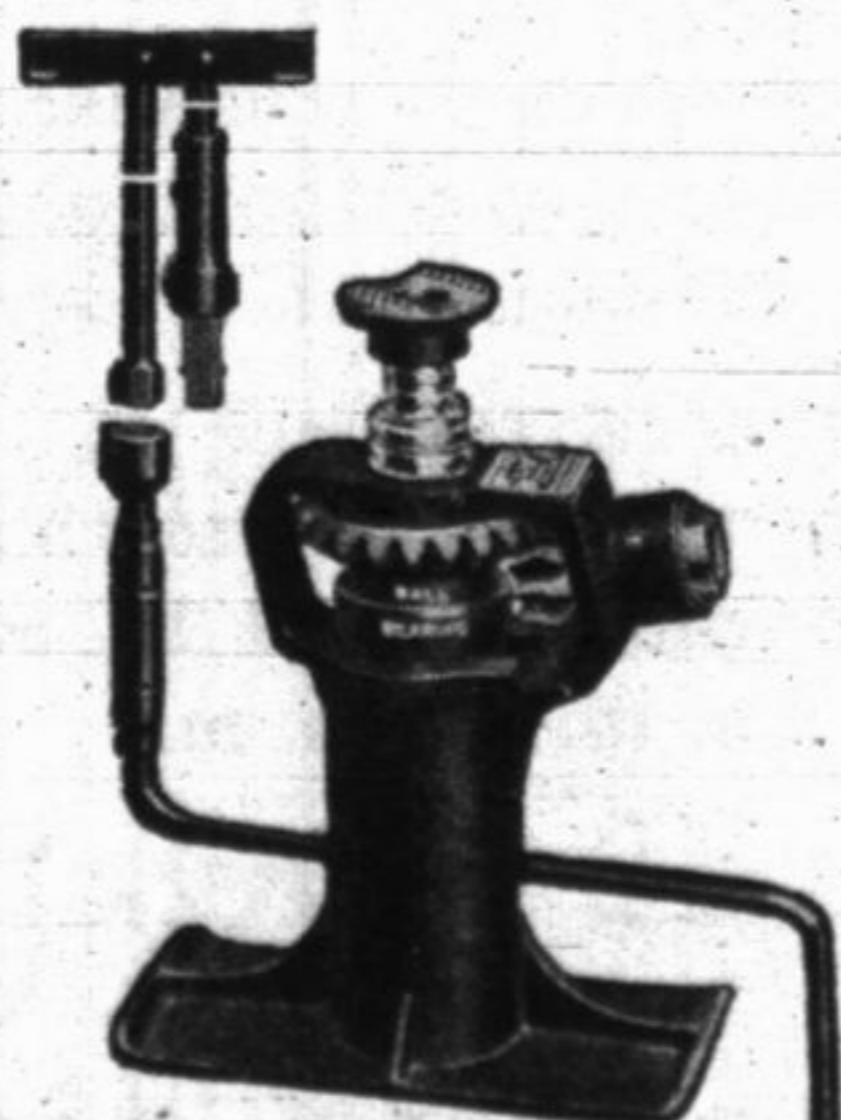

### Women Voters Hear Miss Bertha Bidwell

About 60 women attended the annual luncheon of the Highland Park League of Women Voters on Wednesday. The business meeting immediately followed the luncheon. An interesting perspective of the efforts of this new branch of the league, and a gratifying sense of progress was obtained by the yearly reports of the various committees.

Mrs. George Chapman presided in the absence of Mrs. George Carr and Mrs. Carr's resignation as president (due to other duties for the coming year), was accepted with deep regret. Election of officers then took place, the results of which are as follows: President, Mrs. C. C. Hopkins; first vice-president, Mrs. E. R. Jerome; second vice-president, Mrs. R. L. Grinnell; treasurer, Mrs. I. A. Moore; recording secretary, Mrs. C. Benson; precinct chairmen, Mrs. F. L. Gehr, Mrs. P. M. Prato, Mrs. J. E. Snoble, Mrs. Nathan Corwith, Jr., Mrs. R. R. Bosworth, Mrs. D. M. Blasier, Mrs. C. W. Balke.

The league felt most honored in having as speaker Miss Bertha Bidwell, president of the Illinois league. Miss Bidwell began with a tribute to Mrs. Cheney, whose death occurred just a short time ago, and who was one of the first presidents of the league. She cited her as a splendid example of what the league could mean to a woman as well as what a woman whose life was perfectly adjusted to family, state and friends, could mean to the league.

The league work by no means stops when elections are over, but preparation on the legislative program for the following year is begun at once. The state office has many applications for information, and the league in its national and state research and study is building up a very valuable library of impartial, accurate data.

Miss Bidwell spoke briefly of state and federal measures sponsored by the league. Women on juries (in second reading); mass ballot, the Newton bill, etc. She also referred to the council meeting, which takes place every alternate year in Washington with representatives from every state.

The gradual change from pioneer days, when legislation necessarily assumed an economic aspect, to these days of women voters, when social improvement is more stressed, would be an interesting study in itself. With women working to make lives better for other women, and with such agencies as the League of Women Voters to work through, the outlook is indeed encouraging.

### Woman Arrested Here For Drunken Driving

Mrs. Thomas Mangan, mother of two children, aged 6 and 3 years, was arrested Tuesday night on a charge of driving a car while under the influence of liquor. In the car with her were the two children. She was arraigned and her bond fixed at \$1,000. The case was continued to April 25, and in default of bail she was taken to the county jail. The children were placed in care of the juvenile detention home in Waukegan pending further action. Chief Moroney says Mrs. Mangan has caused the police a good deal of trouble on several occasions. Her husband, he states, is a steady, hard-working man.
