

Muzzling of Dogs Is Discussed in Letter

The following letter is self-explanatory: Editor Highland Park Press: Such a hue and cry has gone up over the ordinance to muzzle dogs, on the ground of its torture and inhumanity to the animal, that it seems all thoughtful dog owners should get together and attempt to meet the rabies situation in a safe and sane way. Even the people who object to muzzles. I might more forcibly say especially those who object to muzzles would go to great lengths to aid a movement to curb and eventually wipe out this dreaded menace. A muzzle, after all, is only a gesture. Most dogs are able, in the frantic efforts to rid themselves of their object of torture, to so far free their mouth that a muzzle becomes no more than an ungainly appendage about the neck! And where the muzzle is so tight that the dog cannot so free his mouth many a case of madness has resulted, due to the fact that he could neither drink water nor open his mouth wide enough to produce proper perspiration (a dog perspires through his tongue) during excessive heat.

There is, however, a sure rabies preventative—just as sure for dogs as small-pox vaccine is for people. It is the "Rabies Vaccine" and can be administered in one treatment by and veterinary, at a cost very little higher than a good muzzle. It is effective for a year, and aside from its benefit to the dog, is the only guarantee against the spread of rabies, and the only sure protection for our children in case of bite. This inoculation by vaccine is enforced by law, with great success, in many cities today.

Of course there are always objectors to everything, and there may be people who would not consider vaccine for dogs. But, couldn't there be a readjustment of the law, whereby all could be satisfied? Couldn't the present ordinance be amended so as to allow those of us who are too humane to muzzle our dogs to use the vaccine instead? A vaccinated dog to wear a large, colored, tag carrying his vaccination number.

If there are people in this community, (and I am confident there are) who feel as I do, or who have better suggestions to make, I would be most interested to hear from them; and perhaps, if we form a large enough group we might be able to accomplish something by taking up this matter, in a body, with proper authorities.

Sealed bids will be received by the Council at its office in the City Hall, Highland Park, Illinois, at 7:30 o'clock P. M. Monday, April 29th, 1929, for the furnishing of one motor driven pick up sweeper in accordance with the following specifications:

The whole vehicle shall be delivered complete and in perfect working condition. No bid will be considered from any bidder who cannot show that he has been engaged in the construction and successful operation of the type of machine described for a period of approximately five (5) years.

Inspectors shall have full access to all parts of the plant where these machines are manufactured. They shall be notified and given an opportunity to be present at tests of the machine and shall have all necessary facilities and aid in examining and measuring all parts.

Machine shall develop not less than 35 Horse Power and have a sweeping speed of from four to six miles per hour. Must be equipped with gutter broom, spraying system, two adjustable lamps in front and one on rear, electric or other satisfactory horn or signal, and two sets of brakes either set being capable of holding the vehicle fully on a 15% grade.

Must be supplied with complete set of tools, 3 ton jack, broom rack and necessary equipment for refilling brooms.

Manufacturer must also furnish necessary instructions for operation of machine and refilling of brooms.

Each bid must be accompanied by a certified check made payable to the Mayor of the City of Highland Park for the sum of not less than ten (10) per cent of the aggregate of the proposal.
