 ning.

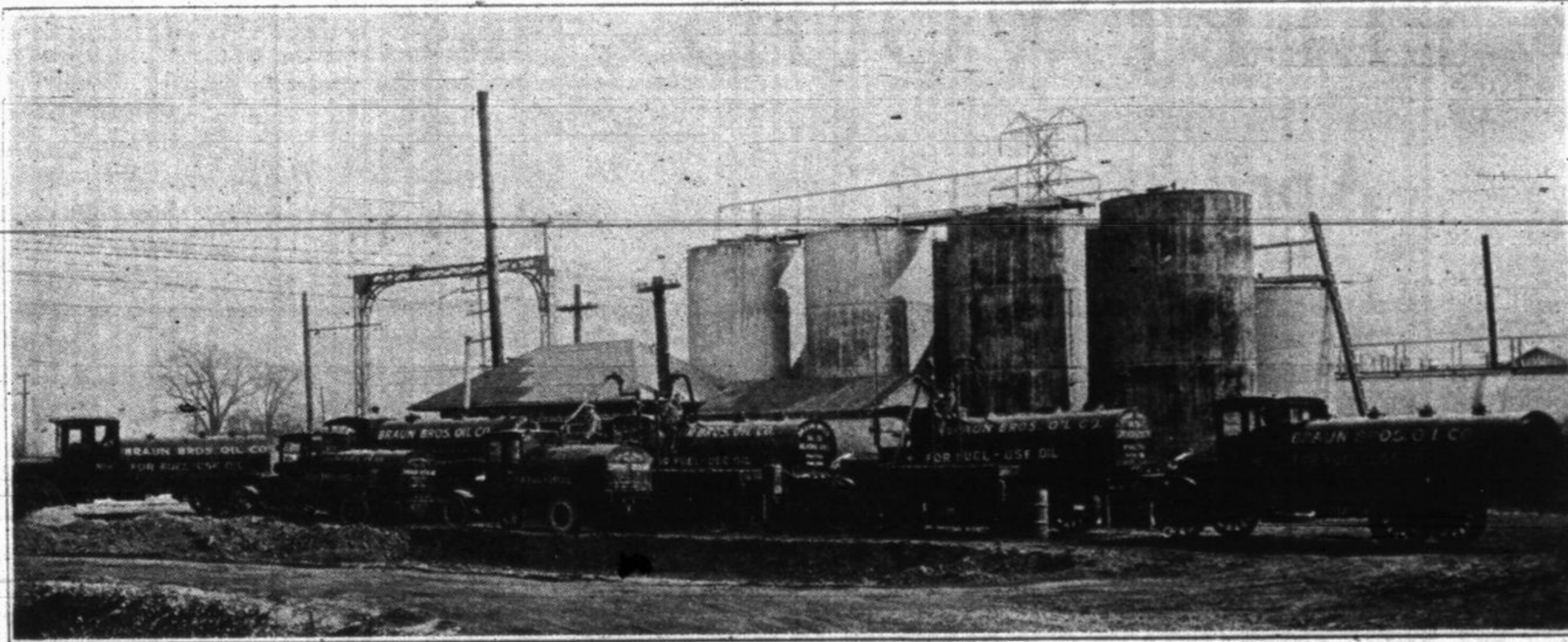

MacIntosh New Coach
Lake Forest College
 I. D. MacIntosh who hails from
 Providence, R.I., and who has been
 assistant coach of Lake Forest college
 the past two years has been chosen
 head coach of the north shore insti-

 five years, has tendered his resigna-
 tion in order to enter the business

Heavy Tax Payment Is
Reported by Treasurer
 The influx of tax money during the
 last week or more has built up the
 mail received by County Treasurer
 Jay B. Morse, to almost 2,000 letters
 daily, he reports.
 Most of these letters contain checks
 and money orders in payment of gen-
 eral and special taxes but there are
 a large number of inquiries as well.

Curious Prints Are on
Display at Institute
 A curious and interesting collec-
 tion of prints, known as the Tarocchi
 Prints, or cards, are now on display
 in the Art Institute print rooms, the
 gift of Mr. and Mrs. Potter Palmer.
 There are 47 of them altogether, only
 lacking three to make the complete
 set of 50. They are small engravings
 not much larger than the regulation
 playing card. Clever illustrations of
 the rank and condition of men appear
 on their faces—such as the beggar,
 servant, artisan, merchant, gentle-
 man, knight, dogs, king, emperor,
 pope. Other series represent Apollo
 and the muses, the arts and sciences,
 genii and the virtues, and the planets
 and spheres.
Glencoe Board Given
Track Depression Plan
