SURVEY OF RESULTS OF TOWN ELECTIONS

Nineteen Supervisors Chosen in Last Week's Voting; Twelve Are Re-elected

Nineteen members of the Lake County Board of Supervisors were named the April 2 township elections. Twelve were re-elected and seven of the successful candidates are new members.

There were contests for supervisor berths in only three townships. Supervisor Dave Van Patten of Newport township defeated Edward Martin for a second time by a majority of more than two to one. Van Patten polled 294 votes in the district as against Martin's 127 votes.

Martin was defeated by Van Patten two years ago after being a member of the board for 14 years.

Antioch Race Hot

Another hotly contested election was in Antioch township. William Rosing was victorious over Frank B. Kennedy by 72 votes. Rosing polled 536 votes as against Kennedy's 464. Rosing succeeds Barney Naber, veteran member of the board, who is retiring.

One of the outstanding features of the election was the re-election of Supervisor H. C. W. Meyer, of Mundelein, for the 16th time. He was unopposed. Meyer has completed 30 years of service on the board and is the oldest member in point of service.

Voliva Ticket Wins In Benton township Supervisor B. C. Thompson and Assistant Supervisor Hans Dronen were re-elected by a majority of three to one. They were endorsed by Voliva and ran on the Theocratic ticket. They were opposed by two independents, W. E. Anderson, running for supervisor, and Harry Welton, candidate for assistant supervisor. The entire Theocratic ticket was victorious.

The new members of the board, four of whom are from Waukegan, follow:

Dilger, Waukegan; Dan Short, Waukegan.

Three assistant supervisors were added to the board, increasing the membership to 38. The assistant supervisor offices were created in Waukegan, Shields, and Libertyville townships. Waukegan now has nine assistant supervisors.

Eldon Shorty Miller was elected to the assistant supervisorship in Libbertyville. He was unopposed. Emil Bollinger was the additional member "elected in Shields township.

Contests for offices of justice of the peace and constables featured most of the township elections.
