Sterling to Succeed Craven at Great Lakes

Official word was received last week at the Great Lakes Naval Training station from the navy department that Rear Admiral Yates Sterling, Jr., commander of the Yangtze patrol in China, is to succeed Rear Admiral Thomas T. Craven as commandant of the local station and commander of the ninth naval district. Rear Admiral Craven is to leave Great Lakes within a short time for China to assume command of the Yangtze patrol.

Re-Elect A. B. Dick, Jr. Mayor of Lake Forest

With opposition in only two of the four aldermanic wards in Lake Forest, a few voters from that city went to the polls last week and re-elected their official staff, giving victory to Alderman F. E. Manierre in the first ward and A. D. Farwell in the third ward.

Mayor A. B. Dick, Jr., Treasurer Henry Rhode, City Supervisor Roy Wells and Marshal A. D. Jackman were elected in the city at large without opposition.

In the race for aldermanic positions, Alderman Leslie Kelly in the second ward and Alderman L. D. Vaughn in the fourth ward were re-elected without opposition. In the first ward, F. E. Manierre won 285 to 79, against Arthur Metzger and in the third ward, A. D. Farwell won 213 to 128, against John Doyle.

Tyrrell of Waukegan Wants to Be Sheriff

Reports that have been current for the last few weeks that Detective Sergeant Bart Tyrrell of the Waukegan police department would be a candidate for Sheriff of Lake county, were confirmed last week by Mr. Tyrrell.

Mr. Tyrrell has been connected with police work for the last ten years. During the time he has been a member of the local force he has established a reputation for efficiency and has a long record of convictions.

Thus far, Mr. Tyrrell is the only avowed candidate for the office although it has been reported that Ex-Sheriff Elmer Green, now warden of Joliet penitentiary also is to be in the race. Chief of Police Lester Tiffany of Lake Forest, a former deputy sheriff under Edwin Ahlstrom, as well as Mr. Ahlstrom himself, also are mentioned as probable candidates.

Rudolph Has Served Township Fifty Years

Election of Fred Rudolph, of 33 Park avenue, Highland Park, to the office of constable in Deerfield township, last week makes him the undisputed claimant to the title of holding public office longer than any one in the county.

Rudolph has served as constable in this township for 50 years. "If I live through this term it will make 54 years," he declared, while

visiting friends in the county building, where he served for many years. Rudolph, in 1879, went into the sheriff's office as a deputy and he remained there until 1924 when Elvin Griffin was defeated by ex-Sheriff Ed Ahlstrom. When Sheriff Lawrence Doolittle was elected he named Rudolph a deputy sheriff, but the Highland Parker refused to take an active part in the office, holding that it was the duty of a younger man, so the "star" became more or less an honorary matter with him.
