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## ANNUAL CLEAN-UP IN CITY MAY 6-11

**Collection of Refuse to Be Made  
by City Trucks; Schedule  
to Be Followed**

Annual Clean-up week in Highland Park will begin Monday, May 6, 1929, and ends Saturday, May 11, 1929, and all citizens are urged to co-operate with the city officials in a general spring cleaning of their premises.

### Conditions Given

It is to the advantage of property owners and householders to do this, as the city has made arrangements to have certain kinds of rubbish hauled away without cost to the property owners or tenants. No ashes will be hauled by the city trucks or teams, and the city workmen will not go into basements or yards to collect the materials, all of which must be in boxes, barrels, or other receptacles and placed on the parkways. The following announcement has been issued from the city hall regarding clean-up week:

The full co-operation and assistance of every householder in Highland Park during the annual Clean-up week, beginning Monday, May 6th, is requested. Collection will be made in several districts according to the following daily schedule:

### Schedule

Monday — Vine avenue north to City Limits.

Tuesday — Vine avenue to Laurel avenue.

Thursday — Lincoln avenue to Roger Williams avenue.

Friday — Roger Williams avenue to County Line road.

The collection will begin at 8 o'clock in the morning and householders are requested to have their rubbish ready at that time so that there will be no delay.
