on Dunes Inspection

Taking the position that Illinois was facing its last opportunity to get Lake Michigan frontage for a state park the board of supervisors last week instructed Chairman James O'Connor to appoint a committee of seven to escort to the state senatorial investigation committee that will come here this week.

"It is a big opportunity for Lake county and the fact that Senator Ray Paddock's bill was considered important enough to have five of the most influential senators in the assembly, Searcy, Hanesch, Wright, Cuthbertson and Lance, come here to see the dunes, indicates that there is a favorable chance of creating the park," Supervisor Frank Stanton, Ingleside, declared in moving for the appointment of the committee.

Chairman O'Connor, who will act as chairman of the committee, appointed Supervisors Stanton, William J. Obee, Highland Park; Thomas V. Murphy, North Chicago; Bert Thompson, Zion; and E. A. Brown, Round Lake. County Clerk Lew A. Hendee is also a member of the committee.

The board decided against appropriating \$100 for the entertainment of the senatorial committee.

"They are not coming here to be entertained. They are coming here to inspect this site and report to the body of which they are members on the advisability of purchasing it," Stanton stated in declaring against an appropriation.
