**Former Resident Dies  
Suddenly in Chicago**

Edward Francis Carry, business leader, philanthropist, and scholar, died at 11 o'clock Wednesday morning while sleeping in his home at 199 Lake Shore drive. The cause of death was cerebral embolism. Solemn requiem mass will be conducted in the Holy Name cathedral at 10:30 o'clock Saturday morning and the interment will be private.

He is survived by his widow, Mabel D. Underwood Carry; two daughters, Mrs. W. F. Nicholson and Mrs. E. A. Cudahy Jr., and two brothers, Joseph C. Carry and Otto M. Carry, all of Chicago.

The Carrys were former Highland Park residents and Mr. Carry was at one time president of the Exmoor club.

**Board Members Not  
Worried Over Action**

Seating of the three new members to the board of supervisors, which opens an avenue to attack the validity of board actions, will not embarrass the county to any great extent leading members of the board declared in discussing the problem.

Under the opinion of Assistant States Attorney S. H. Block he declared that Dan Short, the additional assistant for Waukegan township, and Emil Bollinger, the additional members from Shields, held their seats legally. The case of W. E. Miller of Libertyville was uncertain, he admitted, as it became a question of population.

The board, he held, had no right to refuse a seat if the proper credentials were presented. It did not even have the right as a body, he pointed out, to start a quo warranto proceedings to test the right of a member holding office.

This sort of an action would have to come from an outsider, he pointed out.

In spite of this board members expressed no alarm over the Miller situation.
