RAVINIA SEASON TO OPEN ON JUNE 22ND

Another Notable Roster of Famous Artists Added to Its Fine Repertoire

With another notable roster of world famous artists and with a variety of new operas added to its repertoire of already established favorites, Ravinia Opera will open its 18th season Saturday night, June 22, to continue until Monday night, Sept. 2. This statement of fact which Mr. Eckstein makes known today, may sound prosaic when reduced to mere formula, but behind it there is a story that should bring a thrill to every patron of opera, for the plans that have been made for the season that is ahead are so fraught with interest and give promise of so much that is unusual, that there is every reason to know that it will completely eclipse everything that has gone before it.

The repertoire is of special interest this season, not only because of its extent, but because it is so rich in all of those elements that go to make grand opera of major caliber. All of the standard works so much appreciated by American audiences are to be found in the list, and the standard works it is well known, must form a nucleus of every opera season. But Ravinia does not stop with a presentation of the standards, for this year Mr. Eckstein will exceed all previous Ravinia records by the presentation of a list of works which must be classed as ultra-novelty and which are representative of the best work that is being done by the composers of the present day.

The season as shown by the opening and closing dates will extend throughout the usual ten weeks and three days. In accordance with past custom popular concerts will be given every Sunday afternoon and most of

The new members of the administration are Mayor William W. Geary; Clarence E. Huhn, city clerk; Fred Lebahn, trustee for one year; Edward H. Selig, Edward F. Segert, and Albert C. C. Timm, trustees for two years.

The hold-over trustees are William Barrett and Conrad Uchtman. Alvin Knaak, the present village clerk, said yesterday that already some of the newly elected officials had qualified and taken the oath of office, and the
