Offer Another Course in Parliamentary Law

Return postal cards are being sent to every member of the Highland Park Woman's club, announcing an interesting course of lectures for the Fall on Citizenship and Parliamentary Law, to be conducted by the popular leader of this year's Parliamentary Law classes, Mrs. Maurice H. Lieber of Winnetka.

This course, consisting of eight classes to be held on the first and third Fridays of October, November, December and January, at 10:00 a. m. is open to any resident of Highland Park, Ravinia or Deerfield, providing that the number of entrants is not too great. A nominal charge for the course will be made.

This is a rare opportunity for those who can avail themselves of it, to become acquainted with the happenings of the world, the rights and obligations of women as citizens, and the knowledge of Parliamentary Law, so essential to those who take prominent parts in club work, and to obtain all of this information in a most attractive way. For Mrs. Lieber is that unusual combination—a woman of charming personality and high intellectual attainments, with the gift of imparting information in a way that makes it a delight to hear.

What Camp Is

Arden Shore camp is located in twenty-two acres of Woodland on the shore of Lake Michigan, near Lake Bluff, Ill.

It is a winter camp school for undernourished boys and summer nutrition camp for under nourished girls. Country outing for grandmothers, mothers and children.

In this camp \$125 puts a boy thru the winter camp and helps make him a self-supporting citizen. \$55 keeps a mother and baby at camp all summer; \$30 keeps one child at camp all summer; \$12 keeps mother and baby at camp two weeks; \$7.50 keeps two children at camp one week.

The North Shore Theatre guild is sorry to announce that at the close of "Lilies of the Field" it will lose the services of one of its valued managers, Richard Woellhaf, who has been with the guild in the capacity of technical director.

Mr. Woellhaf leaves to take up new duties as an instructor in the Drama department of Denison university, Granville, Ohio, where his courses will include scenic designing and construction and play producing.

Theatre Guild audiences, remembering the Old English Tavern in "The Man with a Load of Mischief," the cabin scene of "The Dummy" and the moonlit Grace Church with its bright window and the heavy doorway, should be most willing to endorse Mr. Woellhaf's qualifications for the duties he will soon undertake.

Important Position

As technical director of the guild, Mr. Woellhaf's work has not been light. When a play has been selected for production, his first step has been to design the settings and plan the color schemes for the several acts. Considerable knowledge is required, for the guild produces only in the realistic school of the theater, period design and furnishings are often called for in agreement with a plot. Once designed, drawn to scale and constructed and painted in model, the actual work of building and painting is met. The Theatre Guild maintains a complete workshop in the
