**Poppy Days To Be  
 Observed May 29-30**

David L. Shillinglaw, commander of the American Legion, department of Illinois, has given some very interesting information in a statement to the public regarding Poppy Days, May 29 and 30.

Ever since its organization the American Legion has considered the care of the disabled its major purpose. As a result of its activities approximately 250,000 men are drawing compensation; 59,000 tuberculars; 54,000 mental wrecks; 140,000 medical. There are approximately 30,000 in the hospitals, over 3,000 of them being in Illinois. Our problem grows. Mental cases have increased 90 per cent in the last four years. We have it on good authority that we will not reach our maximum number of cases until 1938, therefore we must have our forward-looking program.

Many men still fight and endure the hell of war. We can not do too much for them. Nine hundred ninety ex-service men in Illinois were committed to institutions last year. A great many are still suffering from

tuberculosis and other diseases. No care or expense should be too great for them.

We must and will not forget. You have helped us out in our cause, and we thank you. Because of our experience we feel that we are doing a better job each year. We feel that our responsibility is also your responsibility. It is the duty and the privilege of us all to give and to serve those who still suffer from the war. We promise to administer all funds carefully that we may continue worthy of your trust.

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
