New Dean Ave. Bridge

The new Dean avenue bridge, built of steel and concrete, is nearing completion and will be open in a few weeks. It has been built at a cost of about \$40,000. The Cary avenue foot bridge is constructed of steel and is now in use. The cost was about \$8,500. Repairs have been made to the Forest avenue and the Waverly avenue bridges and the Park board has taken care of repairs to the Ravine drive bridge, as it is within their jurisdicton, so that all bridges needing attention are soon to be completed and ready for use.

The city bond issue for this improvement totaled \$85,000, and care has been taken to allow a sufficient sum to build the approaches to the two Sheridan soad bridges, according to agreement.
