

Plan Organization Civic Opera Clubs at Meeting May 20

A new organization, known as the Associated Civic Opera Clubs of Metropolitan Chicago, is in the process of formation, sponsored by the Chicago Civic Opera company.

There will be a total of 42 Civic Opera clubs, one in each of the 42 districts of Metropolitan Chicago. The central and directing body of these various organizations will be chosen from a selected list of prominent citizens of the various 42 districts.

The first meeting of this important organization will take place on May 20th, at the Stevens hotel, where a banquet will be tendered the guests. The attendance at the banquet will be limited to five hundred—each community sending from 10 to 20 delegates, according to the population of the district.

At this meeting plans will be outlined for the formation of each of the local Civic Opera clubs, and the programs for the year discussed. Through the Civic Opera clubs the members of the various organizations will be brought more closely in touch with the operations of the Chicago Civic Opera company.

Payment for said work to be made in cash on architect's estimates.

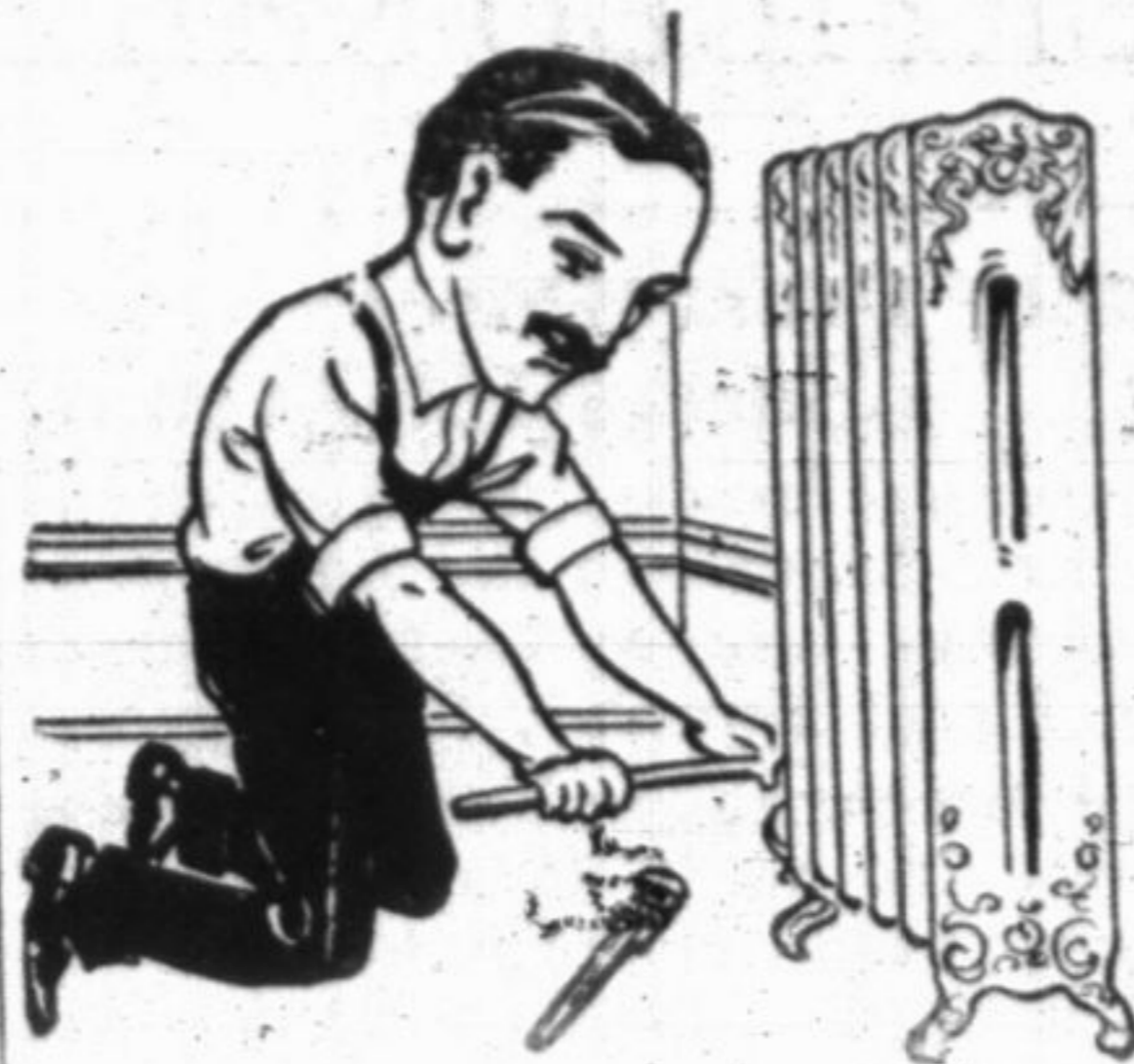

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that bids will be received for the construction of a connected system of sanitary sewers, with necessary manholes, septic tank, in Ridge Road, Ridgelee Road, Old Briar Road, Balsam Road, Poplar Road, Blossom Court, and other streets, in the City of Highland Park, Lake County, Illinois, and the creation of a sewer district therein, as a whole in accordance with the ordinance therefor.

Said bids will be received by the Board of Local Improvements at its office in the City Hall, Highland Park, Illinois, until 7:45 p. m. on the 20th day of May, 1929, at which time and place they will be publicly opened and read.

The specifications and blank proposals will be furnished at the office of the Board of Local Improvements in the City Hall of said City.

The Contractor will be paid in bonds, which bonds will draw interest at the rate of six (6) per cent per annum.

The successful bidder for the construction of said improvement will be required to enter into bond in a sum equal to one-third of the amount of his or their bid with sureties to be approved by the President of the Board of Local Improvements when entering into the contract for the construction of said improvement.
