Home Beautifying and Landscape Suggestions



Flowers For Cutting

Narcissus and tulips are the first on the list in the spring. Then come the early flowering perennials. Dianthis, pinks, Sweet Williams, Aquilegia, Delphinium, Madonna Lillies, Acillea, the Pearl, Gladiolus, Auratum Album and Rubrum Japan-Lillies, Canterbury Bell and Foxglove, Artemesia Lactifolia, Penstemmon Scabiosa, Gaillardia and Coreopsis, Boltonia, Pyrethum Ulfinosum also Painted Daisies, all varieties of Iris, Hemerocallis, Peonies, Tigerlillies and Umbellatums, Liatris, Veronica Subsellis Longifolia are all flowers that may be depended upon for flowers for cutting. They are hardy and come up from year to year.

The arranging of a cutting bed

Such flowers as Coreopsis and Gaillardia give a constant session of flowers all summer, and should be planted near the borders or you should have stepping stones running through your cutting patch, so as to make cutting convenient. Nearly all varieties of Perennials will blossom more freely and produce more flowers when used for cutting purposes. Chinese Delphinium, keeps coming back for a long period.

Pansies

These are one of the most interesting and successful flowers for the

garden, and in order to enjoy them most one should plant them in rows two or three deep along the border. The hardy strains will bloom continuously from Spring to Fall and in some cases winter over for the following season.

Shrubs that should be pruned in Spring

Such flowers as the hardy Hydrangea, the Althea, or Rose of Sharon should be trimmed now, so that all the strength goes into a few buds, as every bud will form a stem and blossom, and the fewer the stems the larger the blossoms. All Spring blooming shrubs, such as Lilacs, Bridal Wreath, Syringas should not be pruned until blossoms fall, as early pruning is merely cutting and throwing away large bouquets of flowers before they have a chance to bloom.

Pruning Evergreens

As the mountain pines are already starting to send up their little candle-like shoots, it is time to prune them by breaking off half or two-thirds of each of these tiny candles. This is also true of any of the other pines that you wish to keep more dwarf. By careful pinching of the new wood each season, one can keep an Evergreen, dwarf and compact almost indefinitely.

Late transplanting of Shrubs

Any shrub that is planted from now on, which has started to foliage, a bucket of water should be thrown in each hole and the dirt stirred

around to make a mush and the plant set right in the mud and filled up with loose dirt on top. The keeping of the ground loose and mellow is also very important in having any of your plants get a quick start and do well the first year.
