## COUNTY FINANCIAL CONDITION SERIOUS North Shore Jewish

Refusal of Governor to Support Tax Increase Causes Grave Forebodings

Refusal by Governor Louis L. Emmerson to entertain any proposition that would increase the general tax rate of the county above 25 cents of the \$100 valuation will leave most of the counties of the state in serious financial straits, in the opinion of members of the Lake county board of supervisors who discussed the ultimatium of the governor received last week, according to the Waukegan Sun, which says:

Supervisor William J. Obee of ity and better understanding | Highland Park, declared that Lake county would have been bankrupt long ago if the earning of the county offices had not been unusually large.

"Not all of the counties of the state are in the "red" but all of those in the Chicago area are," Obee stated.

"Those counties foot the bills for all the evils produced by a tremendous population and get none of the benefits. Cook county is so large that it has special laws but the surrounding counties have to abide by the constitution provided for the other 100 counties," he stated.

Retrenchment Impossible

Two years ago, Assistant Supervisors Thomas Murphy, North Chicago and Ira Holdridge, Waukegan, recalled a retrenchment program became effective. Salaries were slashed throughout county offices and expenditures generally were curtailed. Employes, in many instances, were dismissed. Even this rigid program failed to aid materially.
