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COUNTY FINANCIAL CONDITION SERIOUS

Refusal of Governor to Sup- port Tax Increase Causes Grave Forebodings

Refusal by Governor Louis L. Em-
merson to entertain any proposition
that would increase the general tax
rate of the county above 25 cents of
the \$100 valuation will leave most of
the counties of the state in serious
financial straits, in the opinion of
members of the Lake county board of
supervisors who discussed the ulti-
matium of the governor received last
week, according to the Waukegan
Sun, which says:

Supervisor William J. Obee of
Highland Park, declared that Lake
county would have been bankrupt long
ago if the earning of the county of-
fices had not been unusually large.
"Not all of the counties of the
state are in the "red" but all of
those in the Chicago area are," Obee
stated.

"Those counties foot the bills for
all the evils produced by a tremend-
ous population and get none of the
benefits. Cook county is so large that
it has special laws but the surround-
ing counties have to abide by the con-
stitution provided for the other 100
counties," he stated.

Retrenchment Impossible

Two years ago, Assistant Super-
visors Thomas Murphy, North Chi-
cago and Ira Holdridge, Waukegan,
recalled a retrenchment program be-
came effective. Salaries were slash-
ed throughout county offices and ex-
penditures generally were curtailed.
Employees, in many instances, were
dismissed. Even this rigid program
failed to aid materially. Both of
these board members admit now that
there is no place to start on a new
retrenchment project.

"There have been several laws
creating new offices but no provisions
to pay for them. Financing becomes
a greater problem every year," Mur-
phy stated.

Boards from many of the counties
throughout the state had passed res-
olutions urging that the general tax
rate be increased from 25 cents to
40 cents. The committee to investi-
gate this reported unfavorably to
the governor and was urged to con-
sider the request. His attitude was
more unfriendly than that of the com-
mittee, it was reported.
