COMMERCE CHAMBER HEARS FINE TALK

C. D. Morris Speaks on Railroads at Session Tuesday Night; Other Features

Large attendance and much enthusiasm marked the regular monthly meeting of the Highland Park Chamber of Commerce Tuesday evening at the Green Teapot dining room in the Masonic Temple building. Following a splendid dinner, the business meeting was held and in the program which followed the feature was an interesting and informative address by C. D. Morris, assistant to the chairman of the Western Railway presidents committee on Public Relations. Mr. Morris was presented by J. W. Simons.

Forceful Speaker

Mr. Morris, who is a forceful and convincing speaker, spoke in general on the railroads of the United States and their relation to public welfare, and he divided his address under three heads, dealing with separate groups affected by railroad operation—the people who use the railroads, whether shippers or passengers; railroad employes of whom there are approximately three millions, he said, and who are vitally interested in the welfare of the railroads because it means their own benefit indirectly and third, the stockholders, who today are in large numbers made up of the public in general and not a group of capitalists, which formerly was the idea entertained regarding railway owners.

He explained that to all three of these groups the prosperity of the railroads was beneficial because under such conditions the roads were able to give better service to passengers and shippers, pay better wages and afford better employment conditions to employes and offer better inducements to owners of their stock whose ever growing numbers are made up of people from all walks of life.

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Annual Meeting of Lake County Roads Assn. Held Last Week

Fred Grimm, highway commissioner in Ela township, last week was elected president of the Lake County Good Road Officials' association at a meeting held in the supervisors' chambers. He had served as president of the past year.

All of the old officials were returned to office including Supervisor James Kelly, Lake Forest, as vice-president; Supervisor Emil Ficke, Lake Zurich, as treasurer; Mrs. Lohfa J. Rushmore, of Fox Lake, as secretary; and County Superintendent of Highways R. M. Lobdell, Waukegan, as corresponding secretary.

The organization is composed of county, township, city and village officials throughout the county. Its purpose is to sponsor better roads and better maintenance.

Lobdell discussed highways as far as the state, county and townships are concerned.

At a social meeting, which will probably be held at one of the lake resorts in June, a business session will follow at which road problems will be the chief topic of discussion.
