



Modern Transportation on Land and in the Air Lightens White Man's Burden in Nigeria

If you will take your atlas and turn to the map of Africa, you will find the town of Kano, a trading post, located in the heart of Nigeria, a British Protectorate on the west coast of Africa.

Here, despite their isolation in the midst of a native black population of over eighteen millions, the few adventurous pioneers who carry the white man's burden of commerce and administration in Darkest Africa, enjoy modern transportation both on land and in the air.

Capt. "Bud" Carpenter, M.C., D.F.C., of the Royal

Flying Corps, and now Nash agent with Miller's Motors, Kano, is standing with Lieut. "Doc" Grader, formerly of the United States Naval Air Service, beside the Nash Special Six "400" series touring car with Twin Ignition motor in which they had completed a 5,800 mile reliability trip over the jungle trails of Nigeria. Lieut. Grader is representative of the Wile Corporation, New York, distributors for The Nash Motors Company in West Africa. The Nash Special Six and the Moth airplane, property of Capt. Carpenter, were the first of their kind to be registered in Nigeria.

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Farmer Sues Salesmen to Recover on 5 Lots

Accusing two salesman with falsely representing property in Green Bay Terrace subdivision, located on Green Bay road several miles north of Waukegan, James R. Pooley, 72, a retired farmer in the Village of Warren, near Freeport, last week filed a bill in circuit court to cancel his purchase of five lots in October 1928, and regain his investment of approximately \$20,500.

Two mortgages valued at \$9,500 were given to secure a note of \$1,750 and are in the possession of the sellers, the bill charges. Pooley asks that the note be cancelled and that the mortgages be returned as well as any money invested.

The defendants named were Eli J. Kleinman, who bought the land consisting of 92 acres from Wilbur Glenn Voliva Aug. 20, 1928; for a consideration \$400 an acre, according to Pooley, and the salesman, W. J. Wachliu and S. B. Schlosberg.

AN ORDINANCE FIXING THE SALARY OF CITY OFFICERS AND CERTAIN EMPLOYEES OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK, ILLINOIS

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK:

SECTION 1. That the salaries of the following City Officers and employees, for the fiscal year beginning May 1st, 1929, and ending April 30th, 1930, be fixed at such sum as is provided for by this ordinance for such officer or employe for the discharge of the duties of such office, as required under the laws of the State of Illinois, and the ordinances of the City of Highland Park, during the term of his office or employment, and that such officer or employe shall receive no further compensation from the City of Highland Park for the duties of such office during the term thereof.

That the salary of the Mayor be and the

same is hereby fixed at the sum of One Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$1200.00) per annum.

That the salary of each of the Commissioners be and it is hereby fixed at the sum of Nine Hundred Dollars (\$900.00) per annum.

That the salary of the City Clerk be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Five Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$5500.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Corporation Counsel be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3000.00) per annum.

That the salary of the City Treasurer be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of One Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$1200.00) per annum.

That the salary of the City Collector be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Three Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$3600.00) per annum.

That the salary of the City Marshal be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Three Thousand Three Hundred Dollars (\$3300.00) per annum.

That the salary of Police Sergeants Number One, Two and Three be and it is hereby fixed at the sum of Two Thousand Four Hundred Dollars (\$2400.00) per annum.

That the salary of Police Officers Number One, Two and Four be and it is hereby fixed at the sum of Two Thousand Two Hundred Twenty Dollars (\$2220.00) per annum.

That the salary of Police Officers Number Three, Five, Six, Seven and Eight be and it is hereby fixed at the sum of Two Thousand One Hundred Sixty Dollars (\$2160.00) per annum.

That the salary of Police Officer Number Nine be and it is hereby fixed at the sum of Two Thousand One Hundred Dollars (\$2100.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Foreman of Streets and Public Improvements be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3000.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Chief Fire Marshal be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Three Thousand Three Hundred Dollars (\$3300.00) per annum.

That the salary of the First Assistant Fire Marshal in charge of the Fire Station (during the day) be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Two Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars (\$2800.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Second Assistant Fire Marshal in charge of the Fire Station (during the night) be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Two Thousand Two Hundred Twenty Dollars (\$2220.00) per annum.

That the salary of Fireman Number One,

Two, and Three be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Two Thousand One Hundred Dollars (\$2100.00) per annum.

That the salary of Firemen Number Four and Number Five be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Two Thousand Forty Dollars (\$2040.00) per annum.

That the salary of Firemen Number Six, Seven, Eight and Nine be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of One Thousand Nine Hundred Eighty Dollars (\$1980.00) per annum.

That the salary of the man in charge of the Garbage Incinerator Plant be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of One Thousand Six Hundred Eighty Dollars (\$1680.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Building Inspector be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Three Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$3600.00) per annum.

That the salary of the President of the Board of Health be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Six Hundred Dollars (\$600.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Visiting Nurse be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of One Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars (\$1800.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Moving Picture Censor be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of One Thousand Two Hundred Sixty Dollars (\$1260.00) per annum.

SECTION 2. That the salaries provided for in Section One of this ordinance shall be due and payable in semi-monthly installments on the First and Fifteenth day of each month for the preceding half month of their services during the term of their office.

SECTION 3. That the salary of the Mayor, Commissioners, City Clerk, Corporation Counsel, President of the Board of Health, City Marshal, Police Sergeants, City Police Officers and Visiting Nurse shall be paid from the salary of Officers Fund provided for in the Department of Public Affairs.

That the salary of the City Treasurer and City Collector shall be paid from the Salary of Officers Fund provided for in the Department of Accounts and Finance.

That the salary of the Chief Fire Marshal, Day and Night Firemen at the Fire Station, Firemen Number One, Two, Three, Four, Five, Six, Seven, Eight and Nine, Building Inspector and Moving Picture Censor shall be paid from the Salary Fund provided for in the Department of Public Health and Safety.

That the salary of the Foreman of Streets and Public Improvements shall be paid from the Salary Fund provided for in the Department of Streets and Public Improvements.
