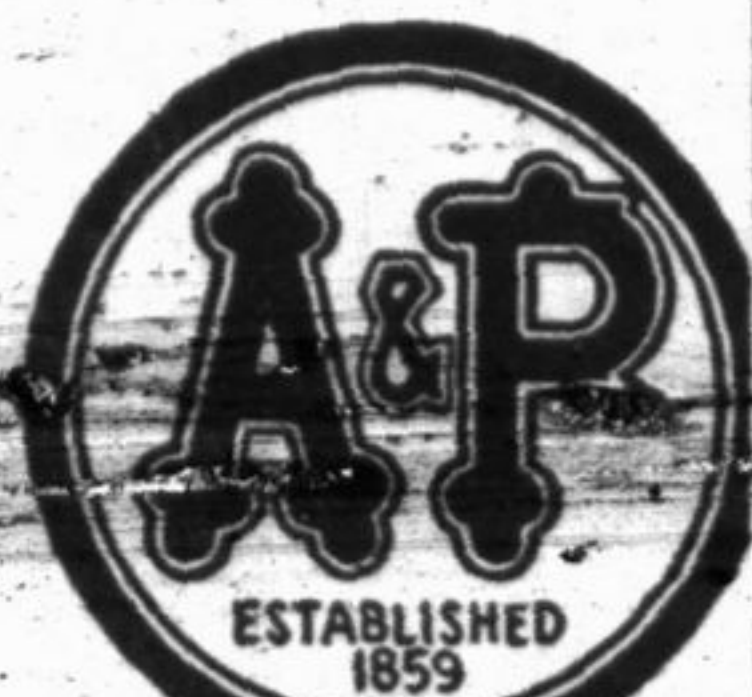

## Kenosha Man in Local Hospital Badly Hurt in Automobile Crash

C. S. Hackett, son of C. S. Hackett, Sr., general manager of the American Brass Co. plant at Kenosha, found lying unconscious in a ditch near his overturned car, early Sunday morning, is in the Highland Park hospital suffering from serious head and chest injuries. The unconscious man was discovered by J. E. McGuire of Milwaukee who was driving along the highway between Deerfield and Northbrook when he saw the wreckage of the automobile. When he investigated and found the injured man, he called the Northbrook police, who arrived at the scene of the accident and took the victim to the Highland Park hospital. It is not known how long Hackett lay there. The car, a new Nash, was practically demolished.

### May Have Fracture

Dr. H. B. Roberts of the hospital staff, examined the injured man as thoroughly as the latter's painful injuries would permit. An X-ray was taken of his battered chest, but no fracture was discovered. Hackett was conscious at intervals and an X-ray plate could not be taken of his head, but according to Dr. Roberts, he had symptoms of skull fracture.

Several versions of the cause of the accident were given, the most plausible among them that Hackett had gone to sleep at the wheel and the car had turned into a ditch. This is supported by the fact that the tire marks' turn show that the car turned off of the road very gradually.
