Save Highwood Woman from Asphyxiation by Gas on Sunday Night

Prompt action on the part of Officer Lyle of Highwood police department Sunday evening was credited with saving the life of Mrs. F. McClanahan, 12 Burtis avenue, Highwood, from death by asphyxiation, according to Chief Walter Henderson of Highwood.

The Highwood police were called at about 9:30 Sunday night when it was reported that gas was escaping in the building. When they got to the place, it was dark, but the police rapped on the door. Immediately a light was turned on and Mrs. McClanahan opened the door.

In answer to questions, Mrs. McClanahan said that no gas was escaping but, the officers got a strong breath of gas as the door opened. As Mrs. McClanahan stood talking to them, she suddenly slumped to the floor and was unconscious.

Dr. C. N. Risjord was called and while he was on his way, Lyle worker over the woman and brought her back to consciousness. Dr. Risjord had her removed to the Highland Park hospital where she later recovered.

Investigation by the police found no gas jets open and no leaks, as far as could be detected. They say they can only guess at the cause of gas fumes in the house. The Highland Park police also were called in the case.
