## "Student Stunts" Draws Year's Largest Crowd

"Student Stunts," the annual Deerfield-Shields "whoopie" show, was presented successfully before a practically full house last Friday night at the high school auditorium.

Following a parade and concert by the band in the auditorium, the program consisted of three parts called "Inferno," "Paradiso" and "Chicago."

The "Inferno" was made up of eight selections, each more or less typical of the modern jazz age. William's Collegians, a jazz orchestra, was the first number on the program. This was followed by the "Deerfield Demonettes," "The Deerfield Drag," presented by Ruth Sloan, a saxophone duet, "Hot Foot" Miller Worthington, "Imps of Satan," "Mephisto the Magician," and Annie Price.

The Second Part was the "Paradiso." This consisted of thirteen selections. The first number was called "Le Paradis Des Femmes." This was followed by the reading of "Mon Pierre." The Deerfield cloggers were next, followed by a Japanese Fantasy, "Romeo and Juliet, and "In an Aztec Temple."

The "Chicago," the third and concluding part, was made up of six selections: The go Boomers, Three Jolly Tars, Harmony Gangsters, Midgots, Kieth and Lester, and the Chicago High Steppers.
